What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

- 1. No indecent Behavior at Libertarian meetings (i.e stripping on stage and making a fool out of Libertarians)
- 2. Every 3 months or maybe half a year, all the state parties meet with local parties to discuss campaign strategy and fund raising. Exchange ideas among community.
- 3. Every year, the national LP has a meeting with all the state LP representatives to discuss campaign strategy, name recognition, and funding
- 4. Offer internship opportunities to small town schools and colleges to increase our branding recognition. Especially with high school juniors and seniors and College seniors. We need to find a way to reach young people, and fluffing up people's resumes is a tried way to speak to young people.
- 5. Every year, the LP should pick 1 state to focus its efforts on to gain recognition that isn't a Presidential election year. The LP needs to stop worrying about getting into presidential debates, and worry about speaking to localities and becoming a serious grass roots movement. The LP needs to designate one state to focus its attention as an experiment. This state will get either more funding, strategists or what ever is needed to bring more small elections to the LP's win list.
- 6. We need to fundamentally change our rhetoric from less antagonizing "taxation is theft" to "government wastes and taxes" or some more tamed version. Voters are alienated when we take hardline stances like borders should be open, all programs should be cut. Larry Sharpe did it best, we should take a directionalist approach to speaking. Meaning compromise. For example, rather than saying we're going to open borders and not deport people. Larry Sharpe says, let localities suffer at their own risk. If your community doesn't want illegals, fine, they can ask ICE for help.
- 7. We need to run ads on services young people use. Say the Ben Shapiro Show, YouTube, Spotify. Even if it's a small 10 second ad, we have to understand TV ads aren't as effective as they use to be: knocking door to door speaks to older people, but ads on services can stick to younger people.

For most of it yes, 3.4 Free Trade and migration needs to be tweaked: we need to understand not all actors in trade and

migration hold the same values. We need to restructure the sentence to ideally want a society with free trade and migration, but we understand that it takes work to achieve this.

# Have you ever served on a similar committee before? Do you have any reports or finished products you can refer the LNC to? What are your specific qualifications to serve on this particular committee?

No, I have not. This would be a first for me. In fact, I am hopeful that we have much more qualified people than I to attend to such matters but have sadly found our volunteer base to be very thin, which is one of the reasons I am throwing my hat in the ring. As for what I bring to the table, I have been a lifelong entrepreneur and have two BBAs from Baylor, one in accounting, and one in entrepreneurship. The faculty of Hankamer Business School saw fit to vote me as their most outstanding entrepreneurial student for the graduating class 1995. Having been a successful entrepreneur in a variety of Industries has given me a deep well of experience to call on when attempting to account for possible ramifications and ripple effects of set standards, operating procedures, and rules. My close ties to attorneys throughout my business ventures have given me a keen eye for what will work and what might be problematic in contractual type legal situations. Honestly, I would feel much more comfortable if our bylaws committee were staffed entirely by contract law attorneys and headed by party members who could give them direction. I'm guessing we don't have contract law attorneys lining up to volunteer to be on this committee, so here I am. If you feel the need to call on me to fill this position, know that you will be getting a workhorse. I take volunteer positions as seriously as I do any paid job. I have been adequately warned that this particular committee can be quite taxing when it comes to work load. In fact, I have been advised against volunteering. However, I do not believe one can respectfully dislike a situation if they are not willing to put in the work to change it.

#### What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

The following is a proposal that would be a good start for deliberation among committee members. I personally favor keeping this issue off the LNC's plate and out of their purview by establishing a small committee to oversee these issues with the JC having ultimate say. But, of all suggested changes I have seen regarding this issue, this one is the most well thought out, with allowance for due process to prevent misuse of proposed rule.

Membership Revocation Proposal

PROPOSAL: To create a process by which membership may be revoked, with cause.

Description: Move Article 5 Section 6 to its own Article. Expand article to empower LNC to remove membership status. Expand appeal process for Judicial Committee to include appeals for membership.

#### ARTICLE 5: AFFILIATE PARTIES

- 1. No person, group or organization may use the name "Libertarian Party" or any confusingly similar designation except the Party or an organization to which the Party grants affiliate party status or as otherwise provided in these bylaws.
- 2. The National Committee shall charter state-level affiliate parties from any qualifying organization requesting such status in each state, territory and the District of Columbia (hereinafter, state). Organizations which wish to become state-level affiliate parties shall apply for such status on a standard petition form as adopted by the National Committee, which petition shall be signed by no fewer than ten members of the Party residing in the appropriate state. Affiliate party status shall be granted only to those organizations which adopt the Statement of Principles and file a copy of their Constitution and/or Bylaws with the Party Secretary.
- 3. There shall be no more than one state-level affiliate party in any one state. Each state-level affiliate party shall, in accordance with its own Bylaws and these Bylaws, determine who shall be its delegates to all Regular Conventions. A state-level affiliate party may charter sub-affiliate parties within the state, which will entitle such sub-affiliates to use the name "Libertarian Party."
- 4. No affiliate party shall endorse any candidate who is a member of another party for public office in any partisan election. No affiliate party shall take any action inconsistent with the Statement of Principles or these Bylaws.
- 5. The autonomy of the affiliate and sub-affiliate parties shall not be abridged by the National Committee or any other committee of the Party, except as provided by these Bylaws.

#### ARTICLE x: REVOCATION OF STATUS

- 6. 1. The National Committee shall have the power to revoke, for cause, the status of any affiliate party or any member, for cause, by a vote of 3/4 of the entire National Committee. A motion to revoke the status of an affiliate party for cause must specify the nature of the cause for revocation. The affiliate party may challenge the revocation of its status by written appeal to the Judicial Committee within 30 days of receipt of notice of such revocation. Failure to appeal within 30 days shall confirm the revocation and bar any later challenge or appeal.
- 2. The National Committee shall not revoke the status of any affiliate party within six months prior to a Regular Convention, or revoke the status of any member within two months prior to a Regular Convention.
- 3. The affected party may challenge revocation by written appeal to the Judicial Committee within 30 days of receipt of notice of such revocation. Failure to appeal within 30 days shall confirm the revocation and bar any later challenge or appeal. The Judicial Committee shall set a date for hearing the appeal within 20 to 40 days of receipt of the appeal and shall notify all interested persons, which persons shall have the right to appear and submit evidence and argument.

At the hearing the burden of persuasion shall rest upon the appellant.

The Judicial Committee shall either affirm the National Committee's revocation of affiliate party status or order reinstatement of the affiliate party.

The Judicial Committee shall issue its ruling within 30 days of the hearing and in no case later than 90 days prior to a Regular Convention.

Failure of the Judicial Committee to rule within 30 days shall constitute an affirmation of the National Committee's revocation; except on matters of affiliate party status except when the last day of the 30 day period falls within 90 days prior to a Regular Convention, in which case the Judicial Committee's non-action shall result in reinstatement of affiliate party status.

#### ARTICLE 8: JUDICIAL COMMITTEE

2. The subject matter jurisdiction of the Judicial Committee is limited to consideration of only those matters expressly identified as follows:

suspension of affiliate parties or membership (Article 5 x, Section 6 3), suspension of officers (Article 6, Section 7), suspension of National Committee members-at-large (Article 7, Section 5), voiding of National Committee decisions (Article 7, Section 12), challenges to platform planks (Rule 5, Section 7), challenges to Resolutions (Rule 6, Section 2), and suspension of Presidential and Vice-Presidential candidates (Article 14, Section 5).

The Massachusetts state committee, not our state convention, can modify the bylaws, so I'm familiar with the purposes of bylaws and how they are used and misused. I'm also currently on the finance committee for a statewide ballot initiative in Massachusetts to enact Ranked Choice Voting, which is less similar.

#### What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

I would be interested in reducing the percentage of members required to form a region. In New England, sometimes we have good representation on the LNC, but at other times our representative is from New York or New Jersey, and we don't have the opportunity for in-person contact.

Totally.

Yes, I have a track record of showing up.

I don't remember all, probably 5-6 total including 2016 and 2018. In 2018 I was the delegation chair.

#### Please give a brief (a few sentences) summary of your understanding of Libertarian philosophy.

No person or group of people has the right to initiate force or fraud against any other person or group of persons. This includes coercing people to involuntarily support social programs. People have the right to defend themselves against force or fraud, and to seek compensation for damages. I think reasonable libertarians can disagree about whether we can legitimately grant exclusive power to even a limited government to prosecute criminal acts of force or fraud and on what constitutes legitimate property ownership, among other topics.

# (optional) What is your position on committee transparency (should all meetings and emails be open to observation by Party members or should there be limitations)?

Meeting minutes should be available to party members. I really don't know about email. If public email is the standard then I'm fine with that. I don't think committee members should correspond privately one on one about committee work.

#### (optional) What are some of your most important accomplishments?

In terms of the LP, I managed the very difficult Ron Paul ballot drive in 1988. We had to collect about 50K signatures in

Massachusetts. Then in 1990, I was a key member of the campaign to pass a ballot initiative to reduce that number of signatures. I identified the need to hire a professional public relations expert, and I paid him out of pocket. The initiative was passed by the voters and lowered the signature count considerably. In 2016 I raised some of the money and ran the ballot drive to get Gary Johnson on the ballot. We had about 2000 signatures from volunteers. National LP pitched in about 35K of a 50K price tag. We finished early and our best volunteers helped New Hampshire get on the ballot. In 2018 encouraged Dan Fishman to run for State Auditor, raised all of the money for the ballot drive and ran it. Statewide petition drives in Massachusetts are probably the most difficult in the country logistically. Petitions have to be turned in to each city and town, certified by the clerks, and then retrieved by the campaign before turning them in to the state.

Aside from the LP my most important accomplishment has been a good marriage and the production of two awesome kids, now young adults. I also was a key collaborator on the first parametric computer aided design system for mechanical engineering. Prior systems were non-parametric, meaning the designs could not be modified after the fact.

#### (optional) What kind of people annoy you the most, and how do you deal with them?

#### What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

One change in mind is to Article 7: National Committee

Amend: Art. 7, 2, C

Any affiliate party with 10% [AMEND to 8%] or more of the total national party sustaining membership within affiliate parties (as determined for delegate allocation) shall be entitled to one National Committee representative and one alternate for each 10% [AMEND to 8%] of national sustaining membership. Affiliate parties may, by mutual consent, band together to form

"representative regions," and each such "region" with an aggregate national party sustaining membership of 10% [AMEND to 8%] or more shall be entitled to one National Committee representative and one alternate for each 10% [AMEND to 8%] of national party sustaining membership. "Representative regions" may be formed or dissolved once every two years during a period beginning 90 days before the beginning of and ending on the second day of the National Convention, and notice of new formations or dissolutions must be given in writing to the national Secretary prior to the close of the Convention at which they take place.

Rationale: This would allow for slightly smaller Representative Regions which may be more culturally alike. An example would be New England: under this proposed amendment, New England would be able to be a single continuous region.

## Are you involved with your state or local party? How so?

I just moved to Arizona, so not quite yet! But I was the Executive Director of the Libertarian Party of Nevada for 2 years. Together, the team and I worked toward exceeding 1% voter registration in the state for the Libertarian Party. I'm pleased to see that as of this past month, they are up to 1.04% - we build an incredible team there that is continuing to grow. I assisted directly with putting on the state conventions, organizing and training candidates and interns, and fundraising over \$10,000/year toward the state party's funds.

After I get moved into my new place, I plan to get involve in the Maricopa County Libertarian Party, or even the AZLP and help in whatever capacity they need and I have skills.

Have you ever served on a similar committee before? Do you have any reports or finished products you can refer the LNC to? What are your specific qualifications to serve on this particular committee?

I served on the 2018 Convention Platform Committee. We worked hard to create several important improvements to the amazing LP platform. Most notably, I worked passionately to represent Nevada on one of our most important issues - sex work. I was pleased to see a nearly-unanimous Libertarian Party vote in favor of our new sex work / sex worker plank at the 2018 National Convention.

As far as reports or finished products, I have years of ten page + reports, strategies, and this sort of thing I can provide that I prepared in my role as the Executive Director of the Libertarian Party of Nevada. These reports detailed our strategies for working toward increases in 5 key metrics, and eventually, delivering on many!

#### What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

Our Bylaws violate the Mayor-Manager division of responsibilities, powers and duties (an extremely effective one between Boards and ED+Staff). They give the power of the day-to-day running of the party to the Chair of the Party. But the Chair should only be in charge of chairing the committee/conventions. The entire LNC should have a say in who runs the Party and that power should be vested in an Executive Director. A person who can be hired or fired at the pleasure of the committee, not unlike the way a Mayor and City Council hires/fires the City Manager.

The key here is to ensure that the Chair can be effective in their role - helping define (in consultation with the LNC) the strategy and high-level vision of the Party. I would strike this from the Bylaws (Article 6, Number 3, second sentence):

"The Chair is the chief executive officer of the Party with full authority to direct its business and affairs, including hiring and discharging of National Committee volunteers and paid personnel, subject to express National Committee policies and directives issued in the exercise of the National Committee's plenary control and management of Party affairs, properties and funds."

The Libertarian Party of all organizations should understand the importance of dividing the responsibilities, powers, and duties of the executive officer into two or more pieces - something nearly every nonprofit and political party in the United States has done to make itself more competitive.

#### Have you read the Statement of Principles? Do you agree with it?

Yes, in principle. Though I think in many ways it doesn't go far enough to make clear our feelings on the State. I also think that by enumerating a list of rights/liberties we support/believe in, we may have missed some important liberties.

But overall, I'm in agreement with it. Just could be worded in a way that makes it more clear our feelings about the State our individual liberties.

#### Will you commit to show up and actively participate in committee email discussions and any in-person meetings?

Yes, I work hard on all of the duties I commit to in life. I have the time and inclination to be involved in the Bylaws committee and all of its important work.

#### Please give a brief (a few sentences) summary of your understanding of Libertarian philosophy.

This is a pretty loaded question for a bylaws application, am I being detained?

Ok - my understanding of Libertarian philosophy is that we believe in individual liberty for ALL, not just some. We broadly, without violation of principle, believe in the rights of the individual - with some notable exceptions, such as when someone hurts someone else (or a minor). What happens when someone hurts someone else depends on your brand of libertarian cola (minarchist, anarchist, etc.).

# (optional) What is your position on committee transparency (should all meetings and emails be open to observation by Party members or should there be limitations)?

I have seen committees work effectively both ways. I rarely make any statement that I would not also make in full view of the public eye. So I have no issue with transparency, but if someone felt it violated their right to privately discuss issues and wanted a closed session, I could understand that.

I have no strong feelings either way. I just want to work on Bylaws stuff.

#### (optional) What are some of your most important accomplishments?

I feel accomplished helping the Libertarian Party of Nevada achieve an excess of 1% voter registration. I am proud of the national attention we received by working to clean up Lake Mead National Recreation area (I was interviewed as the Party organizer for that). Also helped to raise tens of thousands of dollars for an AIDS charity in Nevada, and I loved seeing the outpouring of support from LP members for that cause.

I've had a tremendous number of individual successes (been published for inventing new mathematical metrics, worked on some interesting dark matter research, etc.). But by far the ones I hope I am remembered for most are the ones I've done in pursuit of liberty and justice for all via the Libertarian Party and individual actions.



I joined the LP in 2009 as a member of the LPNY. In 2012 and 2014 I was the Libertarian Candidate for the 139th NYS Assembly District.; 8was elected the Chairman of the LPNY in 2015 and served in that position for 3 years; ran for the 139th Assembly position in 2018; was re-elected the Free Libertarian Party, Inc chairman in 2019. (The FLP is the original name of the corporation that was formerly referred to as the Libertarian Party of New York (LPNY). We now distinguish between the official "Libertarian Party in New York" that was formed under election law and the corporation. The LPNY is the political party officially recognized by the state as the Libertarian Party of New York and the original corporation that was formed under corporate law and is transitioning to a PAC is referred to as the FLP and will be doing business under the DBA of Libertarian Associates of New York.)

Have you ever served on a similar committee before? Do you have any reports or finished products you can refer the LNC to? What are your specific qualifications to serve on this particular committee?

I drafted bylaws changes for the LPNY county chapter when I first joined. Drafted a template for county chapters when I was chairman. Held several Bylaws committee meetings and made significant changes to the LPNY's bylaws. Was a member of the Rules Committee for the new, officially recognized political LP party in NYS, and have drafted the bylaws for the FLP (LANY) to turn it into a PAC.

#### What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

I am very concerned about the way we handle delegates. There has been expressed a significant amount of disgust regarding the wholesale 'sale' of delegate seats at conventions. The policy seems to be, any vacant seat can be filled by anyone. I believe the allocated seats should be mandatorily filled by someone from the state. If that is not important, then why allocate them in the first place?n Not only was NYS one of those who would seak new members at the convention, even 'out of state', but because that was an accepted practice I was even forced into allocating our empty seats to non-NY residents.

I would propose, "The delegate positions allocated to a state must be filled by a resident of the state." For the LPNY, that is no longer a problem because state law requires the delegates to the national conventions of the political parties to be residents of New York State. In fact, our delegates to the National Convention of 2024 will have to be elected at the primary election in 2024. They will not be appointed. In 2020 they will still be appointed (I believe), but they must be residents of NYS or we potentially will lose our official recognition as a political party.

I have and completely agree

At the LNC Meeting on April 15017, 2017, Caryn Ann was appointed to the Platform Committee for the 2018 Convention. In the first round of voting there was a 4-way tie between Adam Bates, Aaron Starr, Joe Henchman, and Caryn Ann Harlos. Those four were the only ones included in the second round which then had a tie between Aaron Starr and Caryn Harlos at 9 votes each (and a majority). In round three of voting Aaron Starr and Caryn Ann Harlos each received 8 votes, and Adam Bates received 6 votes. For the next round, the rules were suspended to allow only one vote rather than approval voting. In round four, no one received a majority with Aaron Starr receiving 8 votes, Caryn Ann Harlos receiving 6 votes, and Adam Bates received 3 votes. A motion to suspend the rules to appoint Aaron Starr failed and voting went to another round. In the fifth round, no candidate received a majority with Arron Starr receiving 6 votes, Caryn Ann Harlos receiving 8 votes, and Adam Bates received 2 votes. In round 6, Aaron Starr and Caryn Ann Harlos each received 8 votes, and Adam Bates received 1 vote. The rules suspended to have the results determined by a coin flip between Aaron Starr and Caryn Ann Harlos. The minutes describe the results as follows:

Using a New Jersey quarter which Mr. Redpath purportedly obtained from The Sopranos on his last visit, Mr. McKnight conducted the coin toss, and Ms. Harlos called the "New Jersey / tails" side of the coin. Ms. Harlos won the coin toss, thus she was appointed to the fifth position on the Platform Committee, and Mr. Starr was appointed as an alternate.

In February 2018, Caryn Ann and Alicia Mattson both sought the Platform Committee Chair position. The results came in as follow:

Voting for Mattson: Carling, Clift, Craig, DiBenedetto, Mattson, Robson, Van Horn

Voting for Harlos: Cholko, Fulner, Harlos, Knapp, Longstreth, Morris, Nanna, Perry, Rosenbeck, Scheetz, Watts

Express abstentions: Fockler, Miron

With 11 votes out of 18 ballots cast, Caryn Ann Harlos is elected as committee chair, having received a majority vote.

# 2018 Run for LNC Secretary

On February 28, 2018, Caryn Ann announced her run for LNC Secretary<sup>[32]</sup> and launched her campaign website in March 2018.<sup>[33]</sup>. Her campaign is managed by Sarah Daggers. She won against incumbent Alicia Mattson and fellow challenger Jeff Wood on the first ballot with 56.621% of the votes. Caryn Ann's campaign was ran with zero negative campaigning and in fact she was cited by Alicia Mattson in Mattson's campaign materials as someone who called Ms. Mattson "one of the best secretaries" she has ever worked with.

# Misc.

In May 2019, after some profound life struggles, Caryn Ann was diagnosed with high-functioning ASD (autism spectrum disorder, f/k/a/ Aspberger's Syndrom) which has sparked in interest (of course it has!) in ASD issues in the Libertarian Party and bullying surrounding same. \*I realize this limit may be irrelevant and impacts no one's day to day efforts, but symbolically I still think it sends a bad message.

# RULES, AND REGULATIONS of the LIBERTARIAN PARTY of NEW YORK COUNTY in New York State

The Libertarians in New York County do hereby adopt the rules and regulations following, for the organization and government of the Libertarian Party of New York County, doing business as the Manhattan Libertarian Party.

# ARTICLE I Party Organization

<u>Section 1 – Basic Organization</u>. Until the primary election of 2020, the basic organization of the Libertarian Party of New York County shall consist of the membership defined by and consistent with the Libertarian Party's Rules filed with the NYS Board of Elections, Article 5, after which time the basic organization of the Libertarian Party of New York County shall consist of the Libertarian electors of each Election District who have duly enrolled as required by law in their respective election districts for the purposes of participation in the primary elections of the Libertarian Party.

<u>Section 2</u> – <u>Territory</u>. The territory of this organization will encompass the entire County of New York, State of New York.

<u>Section 3 – Purpose of Organization</u>. The County Committee is organized for the purpose of supporting and electing to public office candidates nominated by the Libertarian Party pursuant to law, of engaging in political action for the promotion of principles and policies of the Libertarian Party, and of coordinating the activities of all other Libertarian Party organizations within New York County.

# ARTICLE II County Committee

<u>Section 1 – Authority and Power</u>. The County Committee shall have general authority over the Libertarian Party organization of New York County and every subdivision thereof except where limited by these rules and regulations, by the rules and regulations of the Libertarian Party, or by law. All committees, organizations and other activities of the Libertarian Party within New York County shall be under the jurisdiction of the County Committee and subject to such provisions and regulations as it may prescribe.

<u>Section 2</u> – <u>Membership</u>. If a County Committee has not been constituted under N.Y. Elec. Law § 2-104, the County Committee shall be constituted by every voter registered in New York County who has enrolled in the Libertarian Party as provided by statute. If a County Committee has been constituted under N.Y. Elec. Law § 2-104, the County Committee shall be constituted

by the Election, biennially in each even numbered year at the first primary election in each such year, held pursuant to the election law, of two (2) members from each Election District within the county, who shall be residents of the Assembly district containing the Election District from which they are elected except as hereinafter provided in this section. If more than fifty (50), but not more than seventy five (75) Libertarian Party votes were cast for Governor in any Election District in the last preceding Gubernatorial Election, then three (3) County Committee members shall be elected from that district. If more than seventy five (75) Libertarian Party votes were cast in the last preceding Gubernatorial Election then four (4) County Committee members shall be elected from that district. If the boundaries of any Election District have been changed or a new Election District has been created since the last preceding Gubernatorial Election, the Libertarian Party enrollment in such new district(s) shall be used in lieu of the last Gubernatorial Election vote. Each new Election District shall be granted the right to elect two (2) County Committee members and one additional County Committee member for each number of enrolled Libertarians in the new Election District that exceeds the average number of enrolled Libertarians in the other Election Districts by multiples of fifty percent (50%) of the average number of enrolled Libertarians per district, with a maximum of four (4) County Committee members to be elected per Election District.

Section 2.1 Interim Membership. In compliance with Article 5 of the Libertarian Party of New York Rules, Membership for the County Committee shall be open to every voter who has enrolled in the Libertarian Party as provided by statute. Through November 30, 2019, membership in the Libertarian Party of New York County shall also be open to members of the Free Libertarian Party, Inc. who currently are and were in good standing as of December 2, 2018 and members of the affiliated county chapter. This rule will apply until the 2020 primary elections after which County Committee membership will then be governed as outlined in Article II, Section 2.

<u>Section 3</u> – <u>Officers</u>. The officers of the County Committee shall be the Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, respectively, all who shall be elected by the County Committee at its organizing meeting as hereinafter proved. Such officers shall be enrolled members of the Libertarian Party and residents of the State of New York <u>and</u> New York County.

<u>Section 4 – Terms of Office</u>. Officers of the County Committee shall serve until their successors are elected at the next biennial organizing meeting or until the death, resignation, disqualification, or removal from office of any such officer, whichever shall first occur. No officer shall be limited in the number of terms nor consecutive terms in which they serve.

Section 5 – Vacancies on County Committee. If a County Committee has been constituted under N.Y. Elec. Law § 2-104, any vacancy in the membership of the County Committee caused by death, resignation, declination, disqualification, removal from the Election District, or removal from office of a member of the County Committee, or by failure to elect a member, or by creation of a new Election District for which there shall be no member in the County Committee may be filled by the remaining members of the County Committee by the election

at any regular or special meeting thereof or at its organizing meeting of an enrolled Libertarian qualified to represent the Election District in question.

<u>Section 6</u> – <u>Vacancies of County Office</u>. Any vacancy of a County Committee office shall be filled by the Executive Committee which shall meet not later than forty-five (45) days after the effective date of such vacancy for the purpose of electing a successor to serve the remainder of such unexpired term.

#### <u>Section 7</u> – <u>Removal of Member of County Committee</u>.

- a. A member of the County Committee may be removed from such committee for disloyalty to the party, corruption in office, enrollment in another party or conduct reflecting discredit upon the Libertarian Party, pursuant to a hearing of the Executive Committee, upon written charges and motion for removal made by another member.
- b. Upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of those present and voting at the Executive Committee meeting sustaining the charges, the party so charged shall immediately be suspended from the County Committee. He shall thereafter have 30 days to file notice of appeal to the County Committee with the Secretary thereof. If such notice of appeal is not received by the Secretary within such thirty (30) day period, the member in question shall be immediately and automatically removed from membership at the expiration thereof, and a vacancy shall thereby be created.
- c. If notice of appeal is filed, the County Chairman shall call a special meeting of the County Committee to be held within 30 days after the receipt of the notice of appeal for the purpose of hearing arguments thereon. Upon the hearing of such appeal, all available testimony or other evidence may again be presented, either personally or by counsel, by the appellant, together with the arguments for overruling the decision of the Executive Committee. The General Counsel of the County Committee or such other person as may be designated by the Executive Committee shall present evidence and arguments for sustaining the decision of the Executive Committee.
- d. The County Committee shall, after hearing all evidence and arguments on the motion to overrule the decision of the Executive Committee, vote thereon. A majority voter of those present in person and voting shall be necessary to overrule the decision of the Executive Committee. Such vote shall be by secret ballot by writing the word "overrule" or "sustain" thereon. If such decision is so overruled, the applicant shall immediately and automatically be fully reinstated as a member of the County Committee. If such decision is not overruled then it shall be deemed sustained, and the applicant shall immediately and automatically be removed from membership, and a vacancy shall be created.

<u>Section 8</u> – <u>Removal of Officers</u>. Any officer of the County Committee may be removed from office on the same grounds and by the same procedure as hereinbefore set forth in Section 7, provided, however that said procedure shall be known as an impeachment proceeding, and

provided further that impeachment proceeding and proceeding for removal of the offices as a member of the County Committee may be combined in one proceeding.

# ARTICLE III Meetings

<u>Section 1 – Organizing Meeting</u>. If a County Committee has been constituted under N.Y. Elec. Law § 2-104, an organizing meeting of the County Committee shall be held within twenty (20) days after the election of members thereof at a primary election as hereinbefore provided.

<u>Section 2</u> – <u>Other Meetings</u>. Other meetings of the County Committee shall be held at such times and places as the County Committee may decide.

<u>Section 3 – Special Meetings</u>. Special meetings of the County Committee shall be called by the Chairman, upon the vote of the Executive Committee or the written request of at least five percent (5%) of the membership of the County Committee, which request shall be filed with the County Secretary. A meeting called upon such written request shall be held within sixty (60) days after receipt by the County Secretary thereof.

Section 4 – Notice. Five (5) day's written notice of all regular, special, or organizing meetings shall be given to members of the County Committee and when notice is sent, it shall contain an agenda of topics to be discussed at the meeting and a starting time of said meeting. Other topics not listed on the agenda may be discussed at any regular or organizing meeting, but in the absence of a vote to the contrary, discussions at any special meeting shall be limited to those topics listed on the agenda.

<u>Section 5 – Presiding Officer</u>. The County Chairman, or in his absence, the Vice Chairman will preside at all meetings of the County Committee. Upon the organizing meeting of the County Committee, the Chairman of the outgoing County Committee, or in his absence the Vice Chairman thereof, shall preside until the Chairman of the new County Committee is elected.

Section 6 – Quorum. If a County Committee has been constituted under N.Y. Elec. Law § 2-104, one tenth (1/10) of the duly elected members of the County Committee or one hundred (100) persons, whichever is less, present in person shall constitute a quorum. If a County Committee has not been constituted under N.Y. Elec. Law § 2-104, five (5) persons present in person shall constitute a quorum. In case a quorum shall not be present at any meeting, the meeting shall be adjourned to a future date by those present. Appropriate notice of such adjourned date shall be given to all members of the County Committee.

<u>Section 7 – Majority Vote</u>. A majority of votes cast by duly qualified members of the County Committee, present in person unless specified elsewhere in these Rules and Regulations, shall be sufficient to decide the outcome of any issue presented for a vote or of any election.

<u>Section 8 – Voting.</u> Voting at County Committee meetings will be by either secret ballot, roll-call, show of hands, or "ayes" (yes's) and "nays" depending upon the decision of the majority of the County Committee members present in person at the meeting: provided, however, that the election of County Officers shall be voted upon by secret ballot in the event that said election is contested. In regard to the removal of a County Officer or Committeeman from office or membership on the Committee, regardless of opposition, a vote must be taken by secret ballot to record any "no" or opposition votes.

#### Section 9 - Proxies

a. No proxy votes shall be allowed at any time or in any committee and are invalid on every issue.

# ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

Section 1 – Chairman. The Chairman of the County Committee shall be the chief executive officer of the Libertarian Party of New York County and shall have overall authority and responsibility for the operation of the Libertarian Party throughout the County. The Chairman shall be the chief spokesman of the Party in New York County and shall represent the Party in that capacity in its relations with the public, other parties, elected officials, candidates for public office, the Libertarian Party State Committee and State Executive Committee and officers thereof. The Chairman shall perform the duties prescribed by these Rules and Regulations and those usually devolving upon a Chairman and incident to the office of Chairman and those provided by law. The Chairman shall be Ex-Officio a member of all standing and special committees. The Chairman shall make all appointments called for by law or by these Rules and Regulations.

Section 2 – Vice Chairman. The Vice Chairman shall assist the Chairman in the performance of the foregoing duties. The Vice Chairman will be responsible for coordinating the internal activities of the Libertarian Party of New York County including but not limited to the activities of all committees and other organizations or groups operating under the authority of or in alliance with the Libertarian Party or any of its candidates, the operation of all standing or special Committees of the County Committee and all Libertarian Party Local Committees operating within New York County and shall report periodically to the County Executive Committee as to the progress being made by the Local Committees in furtherance of their responsibilities as outlined by the County Executive Committee. In the absence of the Chairman or in the event of the Chairman's disability, all the powers and duties conferred upon the Chairman by law or by these Rules and Regulations shall, during such absence or disability devolve upon the Vice Chairman, or in the event the Vice Chairman is also absent or under disability upon the Treasurer. In the event of a vacancy of the office of Chairman, the Vice Chairman shall assume the office of Chairman until the vacancy is filled as provided in Article II, Section 6 of these Rules and Regulations.

<u>Section 3 – Secretary</u>. The Secretary shall keep the records and maintain the files and offices of the County Committee; shall keep or cause to be kept, the minutes of all meetings of the County Committee; shall notify Executive Committee members of meetings; keep the vote count of all Executive and County Committee meetings; be prepared to supply a copy of the minutes of any County Executive Committee meeting or County Committee meeting upon request to any member of the County Executive Committee; and, perform such other duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the Executive Committee or the County Chairman.

#### Section 4 - Treasurer.

a. The Treasurer shall receive and have custody of all funds contributed, earned, raised or otherwise accruing to the Libertarian Party of New York County, and shall submit statements of the Party's receipts, expenditures and financial conditions to the County Executive Committee.

b. All monies in the custody of the County Treasurer will be deposited in a Bank operating in New York County no later than 15 days after receipt of such monies. The Treasurer is empowered to open a single checking account and a single savings account in the name of the Libertarian Party of New York County. Only the County Treasurer, in conjunction with the County Chairman or Vice Chairman are empowered to withdraw funds from the Party's Bank accounts. Any check withdrawal order or other direction of instruction to any depository bank used by the Libertarian Party of New York County shall require the signature of the County Committee's Treasurer and the countersignature of either the Chairman, Vice Chairman, or County Committee's Secretary.

<u>Section 2</u> – <u>Committee Chairmanships</u>. The Chairman of each such committee shall be appointed by the County Chairman, but only with the advice and consent of the Executive Committee. To qualify for such an appointment, a person must be enrolled Libertarian, but need not be a member of the County Committee or a resident of the county; provided, however, that no Assembly District Leader shall be eligible for such appointment. Once appointment as hereinbefore provided is made, such Committee Chairman shall serve at the pleasure of the County Chairman or the Executive Committee and may be removed from office

for any reason and at any time by the County Chairman, or by a motion of any member of the Executive Committee duly made and carried out at any meeting by that body.

<u>Section 3 – Vacancies of Committee Chairmanships</u>. Any vacancy of the Chairmanship of any Standing Committee shall be filled by the appointment of a successor by the County Chairman as hereinbefore provided. Upon the occurrence of such a vacancy, the members of such committees shall elect from among their number a temporary Chairman who shall serve to perform the duties of the Chairman until the duly appointed successor takes office.

<u>Section 4</u> – <u>Committee Membership</u>. The members of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the Chairman of such committee, and shall serve at his/her pleasure provided, however, that no such committee shall have less than 3 nor more than 25 members. Upon the occurrence of any vacancy in the Chairmanship of any committee the members thereof shall continue as members until removed or replaced by the duly appointed successor Chairman.

Section 5 - Law Committee. It shall be the duty of the Law Committee to advise the County Committee and the Executive Committee concerning the legal aspects of all activities, and in particular to ensure that the activities of the Libertarian Party of New York County comply with the provisions of the New York Election Law. The Chairman of the Law Committee shall be the General Counsel of the Libertarian Party of New York County, shall advise the County Committee and the Executive Committee in connection with any and all legal matters, and shall represent the Libertarian Party of New York County in all legal proceedings.

<u>Section 6</u> – <u>Finance Committee</u>. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to conduct Fund Raising activities and drives for the support of the activities of the County Committee and the campaigns of candidates for county wide office or for other candidates within the County for which the County Committee or the Executive Committee has authorized countywide financial support. The net proceeds, together with the full accounting of receipts and expenditures for each such fund raising activity shall be turned over to the County Committee's Treasurer. The Finance Committee may, pursuant to the instructions of the Executive Committee maintain a petty cash fund for which the Finance Committee Chairman shall be personally responsible.

<u>Section 7 – Public Relations Committee</u>. It shall be the duty of the Public Relations Committee to develop and execute programs to publicize the Libertarian Party, its activities and candidates in all media of communications in New York County. To maintain and coordinate a speaker's Bureau and to sponsor, schedule, and carry out political or educational programs designed to further the ends and philosophy of the Party. The Chairman of the Publicity Committee shall be the Public Relations Director of the Libertarian Party of New York County.

<u>Section 8 – Political Affairs Committee</u>. It shall be the duty of the Political Affairs Committee to follow all state, local, national or international events which are of particular interest and importance to the party, keep a record of the legislative and political activities of all those public office holders responsible in whole or in part to the people of New York County, to perform such political research as may be assigned it by the County Chairman or Executive

Committee, to maintain a political calendar and a calendar of events of importance or interest to the Party and to recommend appropriate individual Local Committee or county wide political action.

Section 9 – Membership Committee. It shall be the duty of the Membership Committee to coordinate membership drives and procedures and enrollment drives in the county, to assist and advise Local Committees in similar activities, to maintain list of (1) all enrolled Libertarians in the county (2) members of all Local Committees in the County and (3) members of the County Committee; to compile and maintain statistics on enrollment, voting, registration and district lines within New York County and to initiate or assist in the establishment and organization of such new Libertarian Party Local Committees or other Libertarian organizations within the County as the County Committee or Executive Committee shall direct.

<u>Section 10</u> – <u>Campaign Committee</u>. It shall be the duty of the Campaign Committee to coordinate all campaigns for Libertarian Party candidates within the county, to advise individual candidates and campaign managers so as to provide a smoothly coordinated campaign in each election; to coordinate the circulation of petitions; to organize all county political actions deemed appropriate by the Executive Committee. The Chairman of the Campaign Committee shall be the Campaign Coordinator of the Libertarian Party of New York County.

<u>Section 11</u> — Communications Committee. It shall be the duty of the Publications Committee to sell or distribute the official news publications of the Party, both County and State. This committee will also be responsible for publication of a county email newsletter, management of social media channels, creation of promotional materials, and maintenance of the website. This committee may act either alone or in conjunction with any similar committee or any Libertarian Party committee or Local Committees within the county.

#### ARTICLE VI Executive Committee

<u>Section 1 – Composition of the Executive Committee</u>. There shall be an Executive Committee of the New York County Committee of the Libertarian Party herein referred to as the Executive Committee, which shall be separate and distinct from, and shall not be a subcommittee of the County Committee. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the following:

- a. The Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer of the County Committee.
- b. The Chairman of all Standing and Special Committees of the County Committee as herein provided.
- c. The Assembly District Leaders of all Assembly Districts within New York County as hereinafter provided.
- $\mbox{d. The immediate past Chairman of the County Committee or Interim County Committee.} \\$ 
  - e. Assembly District Administrators as hereinafter provided.

<u>Section 2</u> – <u>Officers</u>. The officers of the Executive Committee shall be the Chairman, a Vice Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be the Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, respectively, of the County Committee.

#### Section 3 – Powers.

- a. The Executive Committee shall have the power to act for the full County Committee when such Committee is not in session. It shall carry out the resolutions of the County Committee and shall, between meetings of the County Committee, administer the affairs of the Libertarian Party of New York County.
- b. The County Executive Committee shall have the power to create such special committees as it may determine and will delegate the selection of a Chairman of each to the County Chairman of the Executive Committee who shall make such appointment, but only with the advice and consent of the Executive Committee.
- c. The County Executive Committee shall have the power to make Rules and Regulations, adopt procedures and make decisions for its own government and activities not inconsistent with these Rules and Regulations.

<u>Section 4</u> – <u>Administrative Officials</u>. The Chairman of the Executive Committee may appoint, but only with the advice and consent of the Executive Committee, a Recording Secretary or other such administrative officials as he may deem advisable. Such officials shall hold office only at the pleasure of the Chairman and of the Executive Committee, and may be removed from office for any reason and at any time by the County Chairman or by a motion of any member of the Executive Committee only, made and carried at any meeting of the Executive Committee. These Administrative Officials will not have the right to vote at Executive Committee meetings

and may be excluded from any meeting of the Executive Committee or any portion of such meeting by vote of the Executive Committee.

<u>Section 5 – Meetings</u>. The Executive Committee shall meet at least once every two months at such times and places as the Committee may decide, or upon the call of the Chairman, or upon the request of 25% of its members, which request shall be in writing and shall be filed with the Secretary of such Committee at least ten (10) days prior to the requested meeting date. Five (5) days written notice of each Executive Committee meeting must be given to each member thereof

Section 6 – Quorums and Voting. A quorum of the Executive Committee shall consist of a majority of the members thereof. Unless otherwise specified in these Rules and Regulations, a majority vote of those present in person and voting shall decide any issue. No member may vote in more than one capacity regardless of whether or not they are serving in more than one capacity on the Executive Committee, a Standing or Special Committee, or a Local Committee. Each Executive Committee officer is entitled to one vote. Standing, Special Committee Chairman, and the immediate past County Chairman shall have 1 vote. All Assembly District Leaders representing districts within which the last vote for Governor in their district on the Libertarian line was less than 500 votes shall have 1 vote. Those leaders representing districts within which the last vote for Governor on the Libertarian Line was 500, or more than five hundred, votes shall have 2 votes.

#### Section 7 – Removal of members of the Executive Committee.

- a. Any member of the Executive Committee, other than an officer thereof, may be removed from such committee for disloyalty to the party, corruption in office, enrollment in another party, conduct reflecting discredit upon the Libertarian Party, or dereliction in the performance of their duties, pursuant to a hearing by the Executive Committee, upon written charges and a motion for removal made by another member.
- b. Upon a 2/3 vote of those present and voting at the Executive Committee meeting, sustaining the charges, the party so charged shall immediately and automatically be removed from membership.
- c. If the member removed shall be the immediate past Chairman, then no successor shall be appointed.
- d. If the member removed shall be an appointed member, then a successor shall be appointed as provided by these Rules and Regulations
- e. If the member removed shall be an Assembly District Leader, then an Administrator shall be appointed as provided by Article III, Section 4 of these Rules and Regulations

- f. The remedies provided in this section shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of, the provision of Article V, Section 2 and Article VI, Section 4 and Article VIII, Section 4 of these Rules and Regulations,
- g. An officer of the Executive Committee may be removed only pursuant to an impeachment proceeding as provided for in Article II, Section 8 of these Rules and Regulations
- <u>Section 9</u> <u>Hearings</u>. Whenever by these Rules and Regulations a hearing is required to be held, by the Executive Committee, in a removal, impeachment or revocation proceeding, such hearing shall be subject to the following rules:
- a. The charges upon which the proceedings is base must be approved for hearing by a majority vote of those present and voting at an Executive Committee meeting which MUST be held within 60 days from the date the charges and motion are presented to the Secretary of the Executive Committee, and if such approval is not given, the charge shall be deemed dismissed and the motion defeated.
- b. Ten (10) days written notice of the hearing shall be given by the Secretary to all members of the Executive Committee, the party presenting the charges and the party charged, and, in the case of a charter revocation proceeding, to all officers of the Local Committee in question whose names and addresses are known to the County Executive Committee. Such notice shall contain a copy of the motion and charges and of this section and of the sections under which the proceeding is instituted.
- c. The hearing shall be held within ninety (90) days of the date of receipt, by the Secretary of the Executive Committee, of the written charges and motion upon which the proceeding is based.
- d. At such hearing, both the party presenting the charges and the party charged shall be given every reasonable opportunity, either personally or by counsel, to present their respective cases in full, including all available testimony or other evidence.
- e. Failure of either party, without good cause shown at the time of the hearing, to be present therefore, shall operate as a forfeiture of such party's right to the hearing, and the decision of the Executive Committee shall be made upon the written charges and whatever evidence is presented by any person or party at such hearing.
- f. The hearing shall be closed to all except members of the Executive Committee, the parties, including Officers and Executive Committeemen of the Local Committee in question in a Charter revocation proceeding, and counsel for the parties.

# ARTICLE VII Parliamentary Procedure

#### Section 1 - Authority.

- a. In all cases not provided by law, or by these Rules and Regulations, the authority for parliamentary procedure for any meeting of the County Committee of Executive Committee shall be "Robert's Rules of Order", latest edition (however titled), insofar as such rules may be appropriately applied to instill equity in recognition and civil conduct in a meeting.
- b. Any member of any Libertarian Committee in New York County may move to impose Robert's Rules of Order, and if the motion is seconded the meeting is required to proceed following Roberts Rules of Order; no vote is needed. The requirement to follow Robert's Rules of order can be lifted by the approval of a motion to suspend Roberts Rules of Order, which motion is supported by 75% of the members present. The motion to impose and the motion to suspend have no limits concerning the number of times they can be made during a meeting.
- <u>Section 2</u> <u>Rulings</u>. The Chairman, or in the absence of the Chairman, the presiding officer of the meeting, shall make all rulings with respect to parliamentary procedure and interpretation of these, or any other Rules and Regulations, under which said meeting is operating.
- <u>Section 3</u> <u>Disputed Rulings</u>. If a ruling by the Chairman, as hereinbefore provided, be disputed, such ruling may
- a. Be referred to the General Counsel for their opinion, which opinion shall be binding upon that body. Such referral to General Counsel may be either by the Chairman directly or by a majority vote on a referral motion, which motion shall be voted upon immediately.
- b. In the absence of General Counsel at the meeting, the ruling of the Chairman may be overturned by a 3/4<sup>th</sup> vote on a motion to not support the ruling of the Chairman, which motion shall be voted upon immediately.

# ARTICLE VIII District Leadership

<u>Section 1 – District Leaders</u>. One Assembly District Leader shall be elected in each Assembly District within New York County in accordance with the applicable provisions of the New York Election Law. If any Assembly district shall be partly within New York County, then a District Leader shall be elected for that portion of such Assembly District within New York County.

#### Section 2 – Vacancies of District Leadership.

a. Any vacancy of the Office of District Leader caused by the death, resignation, declination or disqualification, removal from the Assembly District or removal from office or by failure to elect a District Leader or by the creation of a new Assembly District for which there shall be no duly elected Leader, shall be filled by the County Committeemen from such district, who shall meet not later than sixty (60) days after the effective date of such vacancy to elect a Leader from among the enrolled Libertarian voters of that district.

- b. Such election shall be by majority vote taken at such meeting at which at least twenty percent (20%) of the County Committeemen from said district must be present.
- c. Such meeting may be called by any County Committeeman from such district. The party calling said meeting must give at least ten (10) days written notice thereof to all County Committeemen from said district and to all County officers.
- d. Any election held pursuant to this section shall be void unless the procedures set forth in subsections b. and c. have been fully complied with.
- e. In the event that the County Committeemen from said district shall fail, within the 60-day period provided in subsection a. hereof, to elect a Leader as hereinbefore provided, then the vacancy shall be filled by the Executive Committee. The County Committeemen, and each of them, hereby delegate such authority to the Executive Committee.
- <u>Section 3</u> <u>Duties and Responsibilities</u>. The District leader shall be responsible for the organization and advancement of the Libertarian party within their Assembly District, and for the coordination of Local Committees, activities, candidates, and campaigns therein.

#### Section 4 - Assembly District Administrators.

- a. An Assembly District Administrator shall be appointed by the Executive Committee for any District wherein the District Leader shall have been removed from the Executive Committee as provided in Article VI, Section 7 of these Rules and Regulations, in which case the appointment shall be made within sixty (60) days of such removal.
- b. Such Administrators may also be appointed by the Executive Committee, whether or not the Assembly District Leader has been so removed, if on written charges and motion by any member of the Executive Committee, that committee shall find, pursuant to a hearing and by majority vote of those present and voting, that the Assembly District Leader of the Assembly District in Question is guilty of disloyalty to the party, corruption in office, enrollment in another party, conduct reflecting discredit on the Libertarian Party, or dereliction in the performance of their duties.
- c. Upon appointment, such Assembly District Administrator shall assume the duties and responsibilities of the Assembly District Leader who shall be deemed to be relieved thereof. The Assembly District Administrator shall be a member of the Executive Committee and shall have voting power pursuant to Article VI, Section 6
- d. Assembly District Administrators shall serve at the pleasure of the Executive Committee and may be removed from office for any reason and at any time by a motion of any member of the Executive Committee duly made and carried at any meeting of that body.

#### ARTICLE IX

#### **Libertarian Party Committees, and other Affiliated Organizations**

Section 1 – Recognition. The County Executive Committee shall have the power to organize and recognize organizations in New York County as affiliated and supporting organizations of the Libertarian Party. Such recognition shall be revocable in the discretion of the Executive Committee and shall be subject to Rules and Regulations, procedures, and decisions made by the County Executive Committee. All duly organized or chartered Libertarian Party organizations within New York County, the charters of those which are in full force and effect at the time of the adoption of these Rules and Regulations, or any Libertarian Party hereafter organizing or obtaining a Charter or receiving an Interim Charter from the County Executive Committee as hereinafter provided in accordance with this section shall be considered as a duly recognized and affiliated organizations.

#### Section 2 - Charters. New Charter

- a. Any proposed Libertarian Party Local Committee or organization within New York County, in order to obtain its charter from the State Executive Committee must submit a charter application in the form prescribed by the State Executive Committee, which application must be submitted via the County Executive Committee.
- b. In addition to any requirement which the State Executive Committee may impose, such application must contain a list of the proposed Local Committee or organization membership, which membership shall be a number equal to 50% of the number of Election District representatives allowed for that Assembly District in the county or 20, whichever is less.
- c. Upon the submission to the County Executive Committee of a charter application of a proposed Local Committee or organization, such application shall be acted upon by the County "Executive Committee within sixty (60) days from the date of receipt thereof.
- d. In acting upon such application, the County Executive Committee must either 1) forward the application to the State Executive Committee recommending disapproval thereof and stating its reasons therefore, or 2) issue an Interim Charter to such Local Committee or organization assigning it a name and political jurisdiction and advising it that during the term of the Interim Charter, it will be in all respects qualified and authorized to act as a regularly chartered Libertarian Party Local Committee.
- e. Such Interim Charter shall be valid for a period of one year from the date thereof. Prior to the expiration of such Interim Charter, but not more than 45 days prior to such expiration, the Executive Committee shall meet for the purpose of determining its recommendation. At that time the Executive Committee must forward the charter application to the State Executive Committee, either recommending approval or disapproval thereof, and if disapproval is recommended, its reasons therefor.

- f. The County Executive Committee may at any time during the term of the Interim Charter, revoke the same for cause, and thereupon forward the charter application to the State Executive Committee recommending disapproval thereof and stating its reasons therefor.
- g. It will be the responsibility of the members of the Executive Committee as a group to keep themselves advised as to the activity of such Local Committee or organization, during the term of its Interim Charter. Such Local Committee or organization must notify each member of the County Executive Committee of the time and place of all meetings and other organization activities.

#### Section 3 – Revocation of Charters.

- a. The County Executive Committee may, by majority vote, adopt a resolution either revoking the Interim Charter of a Local Committee or organization holding such Interim Charter or calling upon the State Executive Committee to revoke the Charter of a duly Chartered Libertarian Party Local Committee or organization.
- b. Such action may be taken only pursuant to a hearing conducted upon written charges and motion for revocation.
- c. Upon the passage of a resolution calling upon the State Committee to revoke a Charter, the County Chairman shall within one (1) week thereafter, forward to the State Chairman by certified mail, a verbatim report of the resolution for revocation, the charges upon which such resolution was based, together with any comments thereon, and a request on behalf of the County Committee that such Charter be revoked. A copy of such communication shall be sent, by certified mail to the members of the Executive Committee of the Local Committee or organization in question, whose names and addresses are known.
- d. Within one (1) week of the passage of a resolution revoking an Interim Charter, a notice thereof including a verbatim report of the resolution, the charges upon which the resolution was based, together with any appropriate amplifying comments thereon shall be sent by the County Chairman, by certified mail, to all members of the Executive Committee of the Organization in question, whose name and addresses are known.
- <u>Section 4 Mergers</u>. The procedural requirements for mergers of Local Committees holding Interim Charters or Chartered Libertarian Party organizations or of a combination of both, shall be the same as hereinbefore set forth for revocation of charters, except that the hearing shall be held on written recommendation for merger rather than on written charges.
- <u>Section 5</u> <u>Jurisdiction</u>. Each Local Committee or Organization when organized and recognized by the County Executive Committee shall be assigned an area of jurisdiction of the Libertarian Party within which it will be responsible for the advancement of the Libertarian party. Each Assembly District within the County is entitled to one Local Committee, except in districts where, in the judgment of the Executive Committee, the size of the Libertarian vote, the

potential Libertarian vote, the type of voter distribution or the geographical arrangement of the district justify the existence of 2 Local Committees. There shall be no more than 2 Local Committees in any one Assembly District.

Section 6 – Change of Name, Jurisdiction or Bylaws. No Libertarian Party Local Committee or Organization's name or jurisdiction shall be changed, except with the express approval of the County Executive Committee. All proposed amendments to Local Committee or Organization Rules and Regulations which are submitted to the State Executive Committee for approval shall be forwarded via the County Executive Committee, which shall endorse thereon its recommendations for approval or disapproval in whole or in part of such proposed amendments. Regardless of the nature of the recommendations made by the County Executive Committee with respect to any such proposed amendment, the County Executive Committee must, if the committee involved insists, forward such proposed amendment to the State Executive Committee for its action.

Section 7 – Indebtedness. The Libertarian Party of New York County, its County Committee and its Executive Committee will not be liable for any indebtedness incurred by any Libertarian Party Local Committee or organization, or any officer, committee or member of any such Local Committee or Organization, or any other organization or officer or member thereof, acting or purporting to act on behalf of, or in cooperation with, the Libertarian Party of New York, The Libertarian Party of New York County, the County Committee or any Libertarian or Libertarian endorsed candidate for public office.

<u>Section 8</u> – <u>Membership and Mailing lists and Financial Reports</u>. Any Libertarian Party Local Committee or organization in New York County must annually by March 15 and also upon request by the County Committee or Executive Committee, furnish its membership list, mailing list, and names of all officers and members of the Executive Committee, and an up-to-date financial report.

<u>Section 9 – Assessments</u>. The County Committee or Executive Committee shall be empowered to assess, in the form of a required participation in County Committee fund raising functions, each Libertarian Party Local Committee and organization in New York County for the operation and maintenance of the County Committee, Executive Committee and a County Headquarters, and for the financing of campaigns.

Section 10 – Adherence to County Rules and Regulations. All Libertarian Party Local Committees and other recognized and affiliated organizations within New York County will adhere to these Rules and Regulations insofar as they apply to said Local Committees or other organizations. Failure to do so shall be grounds for revocation of recognition of the organization as hereinbefore provided or for revocation of an organization's charter.

ARTICLE X
Candidates for Public Office

<u>Section 1</u> – <u>Selection of Candidates</u>. Selection of candidates as regular candidates approved by the County organization for Public Office shall be made pursuant to the following Rules and Regulations.

- a. Selection of a candidate for Public Office representing an area less than countywide in scope shall be made by the Local Committee or organization in whose jurisdiction the area of representation lies, with the approval of the Assembly District Leader or Leaders in whose jurisdiction the area of representation lies. If there is no Local Committee, selection shall be made by the County Executive Committee.
- b. Where non-countywide offices represent an area within the jurisdiction of two (2) or more Local Committees, candidates shall be selected by the mutual agreement of the Local Committees and Assembly District Leaders involved. In the event of a dispute between the Local Committees or the Leaders involved, the selection shall be made by the County Executive Committee. If there are no Local Committees, selection shall be made by the County Executive Committee
- c. Selection of candidates for countywide office shall be made by the County Executive Committee.
- d. Selection of candidates for office representing areas covering more than one county, or parts thereof, together with New York County, shall be made by the County Executive Committee in conjunction with the appropriate Libertarian Party authority in such other county or counties.
- e. Sub-sections (a) and (b) hereof notwithstanding, all endorsements of candidates of other parties must be made by the County Executive Committee, regardless of the area which each office represents and must additionally have the approval of both the Chairman of the Political Affairs Committee and the Chairman of the Campaign Committee.

#### Section 3 – Authorization of Candidates for Public Office not Enrolled in the Libertarian Party.

A recommendation for the designation or nomination of a person as a candidate for any office to be filled by the voters in New York County of any political subdivision within New York County, at any general or special election, who is not enrolled as a member of the Libertarian Party, shall be made by the County Executive Committee to the State Committee, together with the reasons for such recommendation. The State Committee shall have the authority to make such a designation or nomination. In the event that such designation or nomination is for an office to be filled by the voters of a political subdivision lying partly in New York County and partly in any other county or borough, other than offices to be filled by all of the voters of the City of New York, such recommendation to the State Committee shall be made by a committee consisting of the Chairman of the New York County Committee and the Chairman, or person or body of the other respective County Committee(ies) possessing the powers to make such

Deleted: Section 2 – Accommodations. No arrangements may be made by any Local Committee or organization or any Assembly District Leader which purpose would be to accommodate a candidate or candidates of another party. There is to be no actions taken to withdraw any Libertarian Party candidate or to deliberately leave a vacancy for such office on the Libertarian Line on the Ballot when the Libertarian Party has an enrolled Libertarian, who is a resident of the district and qualified to take office according to governing law, to be a candidate that wants to run for office on that line. The County Executive Committee may, subject to the Election Law, only select an enrolled Libertarian as a candidate to fill the vacancy on the Ballot.

recommendation to the State Committee, of each county in which such political subdivision lies.

 $\underline{\text{Section 4}} - \underline{\text{Nominations to Fill Vacancies; Filing vacancies in Nominations. Nominations for Special Elections.}$ 

a. A nomination of a candidate for election to fill a vacancy occurring after the date on or before which a vacancy must be filled at a primary, a nomination for an office to be filled at special election, and a vacancy in the nomination made at a primary or by a tie vote thereat, shall be made or filled, as the case may be, by the Executive Committee of the County Committee, for any office to be filled by the voters of New York County, or of any political subdivision within New York County, or in the case of a nomination or vacancy for any office to be filled by the voters of any political subdivision lying partly in New York County and partly in any other county, other than for any office to be filled by all the voters of the city of New York and Congressional elections, by a committee consisting of the Chairman of New York County Committee and the Chairmen of the other respective County Committees of each county in which such political subdivision lies.

b. In the case of a special election for Congress, the candidate of the Libertarian party, wherein either the whole or any part of the district therein lies in New York County shall be chosen in the following manner. The County Committeemen from the Congressional District shall be called together by the County Chairman or his designated representative within the time period prescribed by the Election Law and shall vote to designate a person as a candidate for the existing vacancy. If the candidate is not enrolled as a member of the Libertarian Party, the recommendation for the candidate to be so designated shall be sent to the State Committee and the authorization of the candidate to be so designated shall be made by the State Executive Committee.

#### ARTICLE XI Amendments

<u>Section 1</u> – <u>Initiation</u>. Proposed amendments to these Rules and Regulations may be initiated by the County Executive Committee; or by any member of the County Committee, upon presentation to the Executive Committee of a petition containing the text of the proposed amendment and bearing the signatures of not less than 5% of the County Committee membership. Such petition must be filed with the Secretary of the Executive Committee not less than thirty (30) days prior to the next regular meeting of the County Committee or not less than thirty (30) days prior to a special meeting thereof called to consider such amendment.

<u>Section 2</u> – <u>Ratification</u>. Amendments proposed by the Executive Committee or by an individual member's petition shall not become effective unless ratified by a two thirds (2/3) majority of those County Committee members present at the regular or special meeting of the County Committee at which it is voted upon. If voted upon and defeated, it may not be voted upon

again unless properly initiated as hereinbefore provided. Upon ratification, the new amendment will become effective immediately unless otherwise provided therein.

<u>Section 3</u> – <u>Notice</u>. All duly qualified members of the County Committee must receive a complete text of any amendment that will be proposed for their consideration, together with the notice of the regular or special meeting at which it will be considered as hereinbefore provided.

# ARTICLE XII Notice Requirement

- a. Whenever, by these Rules and Regulations written notice of a specified number of days is required, such requirement must be satisfied by either depositing such notice in a United States Post Office, or a receptacle maintained by the United States Post office for deposit of mail, or by personal deliver of said notice, all of which must be done at least the specified number of days prior to the date of the event of which notice is given. If the notice is mailed as aforesaid, it must be addressed to the party to be notified at their last known address, and unless a different class of mail is specified by the selection requiring such notice, sent by first class mail with postage prepaid.
- b. When the County Committee member has signed an agreement to receive such notices by email in lieu of a notice sent using the United States Post Office services, such email notice shall be deemed to have been sent and delivered the date and time the notice was sent to the individual(s).
- c. Sub-sections (a) and (b) hereof notwithstanding, if a County Committee has not been constituted under N.Y. Elec. Law § 2-104, notice by direct email shall be considered written notice and reasonably adequate publication on social media (e.g., not in closed groups) shall be considered adequate written notice to all members of the County Committee.

#### ARTICLE XIII Severability

In the event that any Article, Section, Subsection or part of these bylaws are declared unconstitutional, void or in violation of the laws of the State of New York it shall only affect such Article, Section, Subsection or part and it shall in no way affect the remainder of these rules.

# ARTICLE XIV Effective Date

These Rules and Regulations shall become effective immediately upon their approval by a majority vote at the organizing meeting of the Interim County Committee provided for by Article III, Section 1 hereof, and shall remain in full force and effect as enacted, and as amended as hereinbefore provided, unless new Rules and Regulations expressly revoking and

superseding these Rules and Regulations are adopted by any subsequent, regular or special or organizing meeting of the duly elected County Committee, it being unnecessary for each such County Committee to affirmatively re-enact these Rules and Regulations at its organizing meeting.

#### Are you involved with your state or local party? How so?

Been a state committee member in some shape way or form from 1996 through the present, excepting a gap from 2004 to 2007. I've held the positions of secretary, state chairman, and currently as treasurer.

I've run for state legislature three times, (1998,2000, and a special election in 2015).

I'm currently serving my second 4 year term as a committee member of the Knox County (Maine) Budget Committee. My first term was filling a vacancy, I was elected to my second term, and plan on running for reelection in 2020.

Have you ever served on a similar committee before? Do you have any reports or finished products you can refer the LNC to? What are your specific qualifications to serve on this particular committee?

In 2012, 2014, and 2016 I was a part of (or had been the entirety of) the state party bylaws committee. I contributed a few bylaw proposals in 2018.

Attached to this application are pdfs of LPME bylaws and the proposals I wrote to change them in '12,' 14 & '16 . The formats of the proposal presentations were strongly influenced by the materials provided in the national convention manuals.

I've always considered myself a bit of a process geek, as rules and bylaws interested me far more than platforms do. (As seen by my encouragement of the Libertarian Party of Maine to adopt the "World's Smallest Political Platform" in lieu of anything more detailed).

For as long as I can remember the Bylaws & Rules Committee has requested feedback from members in the form of a survey prior to conventions, I have always responded, usually with some commentary on each proposal.

I've also commented publicly on Bylaws proposals in many internet forums, especially on IPR. My comments on many of last year's proposals can be found at https://independentpoliticalreport.com/2018/05/lp-org-bylaws-committee-proposals-for-national-convention/

#### What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

With Maine's adoption of ranked-choice voting (aka instant runoff voting) for presidential elections, a clarification is needed on the allocation of delegates to the LP National Convention

If the final round of tabulation is used, then an affiliate under this system could easily be considered to have had no votes at all for the Libertarian candidates, or if in the position of gaining more votes in later rounds (unlikely, but theoretically possible) have an unfair advantage over other affiliates without RCV.

With that in mind, I'd propose the following to be added to bylaws Article 10: Conventions; Section 4b:

"If a state conducts its presidential election via Ranked-Choice or Instant Runoff Voting, the first choice ballots for the Libertarian candidate as tabulated in the first round of ballot counting will be used for this purpose"

#### Have you read the Statement of Principles? Do you agree with it?

Yes, and yes.

Even before I'd even HEARD the term Libertarian, I considered government power to be overrated. So the first sentence phrase stating that we, "challenge the cult of the omnipotent state" is one that I particularly loved and never understood the problem some had with it. Maybe the term "cult" is a bit loaded and overshoots the mark, but that's the worst I can say about it.

I feel the 7/8ths barrier to change it is overkill, especially as it is 7/8th of all credentialed delegates. Better that it be 7/8ths of delegates present, given the difficulty of getting that many of the registered delegates on the floor at any given point outside of presidential nominations.

It's still a high standard but if that many delegates really object to the statement, it merely creates an awkward situation where a party actively is trying to bury a statement that it isn't holding to, and it would be doubtful that delegates would be electing an LNC, or Judicial Committee to enforce the principles in that scenario.

#### Will you commit to show up and actively participate in committee email discussions and any in-person meetings?

I live on the internet and have started setting "LP office hours" for myself to make sure I keep on top of my commitments. Better that I spend my commenting time on something practical than on other people's blog posts.

Which is my long-winded way of saying "yes" to actively participating in email discussions

I have the flexibility with my work to be able to travel every now and again. If we're talking about 4 or more, that may be more than I can take on, but fewer are doable presuming that they are weekend meetings.

#### Which national conventions have you attended?

'98, '00, '02, '08, '10, '12, '14, '16, '18

#### Please give a brief (a few sentences) summary of your understanding of Libertarian philosophy.

Government is overrated.

The smaller, more local the government, the better, with the ideal being the individual governing his or herself.

Social goals are better attained by direct action on those goals, not lobbying governments to do it on their behalf. Communication, persuasion, association, and understanding the interests of others are the tools to use in lieu of government power.

# (optional) What is your position on committee transparency (should all meetings and emails be open to observation by Party members or should there be limitations)?

I have no objection to it.

In fact, given that all the committee's work ultimately has to go to the convention for approval, it seems logical to do it that way.

I've heard enough paranoid theories about rules & bylaws proposals that the more open the better. (Although some will remain suspicious no matter what)

I'm willing to entertain reasons why some communications should be private, but exceptions could easily be abused. (Case in point: A recent executive session of the Knox County Commissioners was accidentally broadcast on the internet, revealing discussions that legally shouldn't have taken place during executive session,)

I'm used to the concept of total transparency, as Maine law requires it of most municipal and county communications of elected officials. Even to the point where we CAN'T communicate in group emails about the budget committee matters outside of providing information that is already publicly available. I was even required to take training on this prior to becoming a member of my county's budget committee.

#### (optional) What are some of your most important accomplishments?

Within the context of the LP: Keeping alive the LP of Maine during some low activity points. Running for office. Serving in office.

In general: Maintaining an ability to understand the concerns of those who disagree with me, and the humility to work with them.

#### (optional) What kind of people annoy you the most, and how do you deal with them?

Those who insult, belittle, or demonize others as a means of (or substitute for) debate. My ways of dealing with them:

- 1. Don't. (One of the great things about the right to free association is the choice to not associate yourself with people if you choose)
- 2. Try to show them the honest motivations of others, and how their methods hurt their own image. If that doesn't work, shrug, and go back to #1, knowing you gave it a shot.

# Bylaws of the Libertarian Party of Maine, Inc.

As Adopted on April 17, 2010

# ARTICLE I - Name

The name of the corporation shall be the "Libertarian Party of Maine, Inc.", hereinafter referred to as the "Party".

# ARTICLE II - Purpose

The purpose of the Party is to implement and give voice to the libertarian principles such as those in the "Statement of Principles" of the Libertarian Party of the United States by:

- a. Promoting candidates for public office within Maine;
- b. Working for the election of the national Libertarian Party nominee for President and Vice-President;
- c. Promoting, chartering and coordinating affiliate parties throughout the State of Maine;
- d. Entering into informational and educational activities;
- e. Supporting or opposing referenda, ballot initiatives, citizen vetoes, and other ballot questions; and
- f. Engaging in any and all additional activities necessary and proper to advance the "Statement of Principles" and the cause of Liberty in America.

# ARTICLE III - Principles

The Party shall take no positions or actions inconsistent with the "Statement of Principles" of the national Libertarian Party.

# ARTICLE IV - Membership

- 1. Membership in the Party is not to be restricted by a person's race, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, or residency.
- 2. There are no dues or fees charged or levied to become a full member of the Party. Voluntary contributions are accepted. A person may become an "enrolled" member of the Party in accordance with state law.

# ARTICLE V – Organization

#### 1. Officers

- a. The officers of the Party shall be Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer. Term of office shall be one year. These officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, Special Meeting or Biennial Convention by the attending full members and shall take office immediately upon the close of such Meeting or Convention and serve until the final adjournment of the next Meeting or Convention. All officers will be elected by a simple majority.
- b. No offices shall be combined.

- c. The officers shall have such powers and perform such duties as are delegated by the Executive Committee and are not inconsistent with the provisions of these Bylaws, and the laws of the State of Maine.
- d. Any officer of the Party may be temporarily suspended by a vote of three (3) Executive Committee members, subject to ratification by a 2/3 vote of the full members attending a special convention called for such purpose. The members will then elect a replacement officer. Such officer will complete the term of office vacated.
- e. The Executive Committee shall appoint new officers and district members if vacancies, not due to suspensions, occur. Such officers and Executive Committee members will complete the term of office vacated.
- f. An Organizing Officer will be selected at the organizing meeting. The Organizing Officer will have the authority to call a Convention. The Organizing Officer will chair the Convention and that position will have no further authority after the adjournment of that Convention.

#### 2. Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is the Board of Directors for the purposes of the Maine Nonprofit Corporation Act, and shall be responsible for the control and management of all the affairs, properties, and funds of the Party consistent with these Bylaws. The Executive Committee shall meet at such times and places as may be determined by the committee, by call of the chair, or by the written request of any two (2) members of the committee. More than one half of the membership thereof shall constitute a quorum at all meetings. The Executive Committee by majority vote may agree to allow absentee ballots by mail or telephone. No secret meeting will be held by the Executive Committee; all meetings will be open to all Party members.

The Executive Committee shall meet at least four (4) times per calendar year. Notice of all Executive Committee meetings shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the Party website shall be considered notice of the meeting.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the following:

- a. The four elected officers of the party;
- b. Two district members, one from each Congressional district; and
- c. One At-Large member.
- 3. The district and affiliate party members shall serve as the "district" and "county" committees when required under state law.
- 4. Affiliate Parties The Executive Committee shall have the power to charter and set the geographical area of affiliate parties.
- 5. Judicial Committee. A Judicial Committee may be formed. The Judicial Committee shall be composed of five (5) full members appointed by the Executive Committee. The term of a member of the Judicial Committee shall run through the period of the next Party convention and until a successor is appointed. No officer of the Party may serve on the Judicial Committee. The Judicial Committee shall be the final body of appeal in all matters regarding interpretation of the Bylaws, Rules, or Resolutions of the Party subject to the provision that a decision of the Committee may be overturned by a 2/3 vote of a convention.

6. Exhaustion. In the event that all Executive Committee positions become vacant, former Executive Committee members who are willing and qualified to be members of the Executive Committee shall constitute themselves as the Interim Executive Committee. They shall promptly act as described in this Article to fill positions on the Executive Committee. Until it is replaced via Elections at a Convention, Annual Meeting or Special Meeting under Article VI of these Bylaws, the Interim Executive Committee shall have all powers and bear all responsibilities of the regular Executive Committee.

# ARTICLE VI - Annual Meeting and Conventions

1. The Party shall have annual meetings of members during Spring. Notice of the Annual Meeting shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the Party website shall be considered notice of the meeting. Should said notice not be provided, a Special Meeting may be called as provided by this Article.

#### 2. Conventions

- a. Except as provided under Article V, Section 1f of these Bylaws, the Party shall hold a Convention every two years at the time and place selected by the Executive Committee. The Party may have such additional conventions as may be deemed desirable by the Executive Committee. A special Convention may be called by presenting a petition signed by 1/2 of the members of the Party, such Convention to be held within 30 days of the presentation to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall appoint a convention committee to arrange the Convention. Notice of the Convention shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said Convention. Posting of notice on the Party website shall be considered notice of the Convention.
- b. Any full member attending any Convention of the Party may cast a vote as a delegate.
- c. A Convention called for the purpose of nominating delegates and alternates to the national Convention shall be held within a year of the national Convention after the number of delegates is announced.
- d. If a Biennial Convention is not called as provided under this Article by May 1 of any convention year, any five (5) members of the Party may call the Convention. Notice of the Convention shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said Convention. Posting of notice on the national Libertarian Party website (www.lp.org) shall be considered notice of the Convention.

#### 3. Special Meeting

If an Annual Meeting is not called as provided under this Article by June 1 of any non-convention year, any five (5) members of the Party may call a Special Meeting. Notice of the Special Meeting shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the national Libertarian Party website (<a href="www.lp.org">www.lp.org</a>) shall be considered notice of the meeting. New Officers will be elected at the Special Meeting, and other business will be conducted as required.

# ARTICLE VII - Platform

- 1. The Party may adopt a platform. The platform shall include, but need not be limited to, the Libertarian Party's National Committee's "Statement of Principles" and the implementation of the principles contained in the "Statement" in the form of planks.
- 2. The Executive Committee shall appoint a Platform Committee whose responsibility it is to write and submit said submit said platform to the Convention for approval on a plank by plank basis by a 2/3 majority of the delegates present and voting at the Convention.

# ARTICLE VIII - None of the Above

- 1. Votes cast for "None of the Above" in voting on the Party's candidates for delegates to national Libertarian Party conventions, representatives to the national Libertarian Party platform committee, and for the four Party officers shall be considered valid and properly recorded.
- 2. Should "None of the Above" receive a majority for an officer, another election for that office shall be called.

# ARTICLE IX - Election of delegates to Libertarian Party National Conventions

- 1. All delegates and alternates shall be full members.
- 2. Delegates and alternates shall be elected by full members in attendance at the Party's convention in the year of the Libertarian Party National Convention.
  - a. The first step in electing delegates shall be to receive any number of seconded nominations.
  - b. The Party Convention attendants shall then vote by secret ballot for "acceptable" nominees of their choice. Delegates may also indicate "unacceptable" nominees.
  - c. Only those nominees receiving more "acceptable" votes than "unacceptable" votes shall be delegates or alternates. They shall be ranked in order of number of "acceptable" votes received.
  - d. Should there be more winners than slots allocated by the National Libertarian Party those with the most "acceptable" votes shall be delegates and those remaining shall be alternates.
  - e. In case of ties for the last regular delegate slots, all those tied shall be ranked by voting Party Convention attendees. Those with the highest rank sum are regular delegates. Further ties shall be resolved by the Chair.
  - f. The next ranking alternate, as determined by the Chair, shall become a regular delegate in case a regular cannot attend the Libertarian Party National Convention. Other alternates shall substitute for regular delegates on the National Convention floor.
- 3. If the Party is eligible to elect a national Libertarian Party Platform Committee member under the Rules, Constitution, or Bylaws of the national Libertarian Party, the election of such member will be by majority vote of the full members present and voting at the Convention. Voting shall be done by secret ballot. An alternate shall also be elected for this position.
- 4. The head of the delegation shall be nominated and elected by the convention from among the persons who have been elected as delegates. An alternate head shall also be elected.
- 5. At the National Convention, the elected delegation head may select additional people to fill open delegate positions.

# ARTICLE X – Parliamentary Authority

Roberts Rules of Order-Newly Revised may be consulted for guidance for all matters or procedure not specifically covered by the Bylaws of the Party.

# ARTICLE XI - Amendments

- 1. These Bylaws may be amended by a 2/3 vote of the members voting on that particular issue at any Biennial Convention, Annual Meeting or Special Meeting.
- 2. Article IV, 1, Article V, 1.d, , and this Article shall not be amended or suspended without a 7/8 vote.

## Report of the Libertarian Party of Maine Bylaws Committee.

A bylaws committee was created by the LPME executive committee.

It consisted of Shawn Levasseur, Jorge Maderal, and Charles Jacques.

Shawn Levasseur presented the following proposals for bylaws changes, all were approved by the committee.

They are presented in the committees order of importance.

The actual language to be inserted or altered is presented in the shaded paragraphs. New text to be added is underlined, and in bold. Text to be deleted is struck through, and is in italics.

Each proposal will be submitted to the LPME convention for debate, and a vote to approve. A 2/3 supermajority yea vote by the convention is required for all changes to the bylaws.

If the time allotted for the Bylaws report expires before all proposals are heard, the proposal being debated (and any amdendments to that proposal have been moved and seconded) at the time shall immediately go a vote, and the remaining items in the report will not be considered.

If all proposals are heard and there is time remaining in the agenda, the proposals from the floor may be moved to be heard by the convention.

Note from the author of these proposals, Shawn Levasseur:

All proposals are presented as they were to the committee, including my own commentary. I'm not entirely sure such comment is appropriate in the report, but the time spent editing is prohibitive. I hope the comment within serves only to inform, but I apologize if anyone feels this is an undue influence on the convention.

# Proposal 1: Reasserting Robert's Rules as the Parliamentary Authority

Problem: A subtle change two years ago essentially means that the LPME follows no rules of order at all, with no clear authority. We need to return to the previous wording.

## Proposal:

Change article X (Parliamentary Authority) as follows:

"Roberts Rules of Order-Newly Revised shall may be consulted be the parliamentary authority for guidance for all matters or procedure not specifically covered by the Bylaws of the Party."

Notes: "May be consulted" leaves rules in chaos, and potentially enables the abuse of authority.

Some have objected to Robert's rules due to confusion caused by those jumping into meetings without a rudimentary knowledge of the Rules of Order, mis-interpreting the point of the rules as one of lawyerly highjacking of a meeting. This is made worse by individuals thinking they need to study and understand the entire Robert's Rules, when, for the most part, all the average member of a group needs is the primer, "Roberts Rules in Brief" by the same authors of the full Robert's Rules.

I consider this a critical change. The phrase "may be consulted" makes the whole article irrelevant, and allows for matters not covered in the bylaws to become Calvinball, where the rules are whatever anyone asserts them to be in a given moment.

# **Proposal 2. Definition of "Full Member"**

Problem: The definition of membership is unclear. There are clauses preventing discrimination or requiring dues of members. The reference to being "enrolled under state law" is merely a definition for registering to vote as a libertarian, and only exist to conform to state law if we ever get state ballot access, but no definition of a minimum requirement to be a member according to our current bylaws.

History: This part used to have language that deferred the definition of membership to the national party. Which was fine back when we had the "Unified Membership Plan". Today, a clarification is needed.

Proposal: To insert a new part at the beginning of Article IV (Membership) that reads as follows:

"1. Full members of the Party shall be those persons residing in Maine, who have certified in writing that they oppose the initiation of force to achieve political or social goals. This certification may be submitted to etiher the national Libertarian Party, or the Libertarian Party of Maine."

With all other parts to be renumbered accordingly.

Notes: This wording is based on the membership definition in the national bylaws.

This is consistent with how membership has always been considered in the Maine LP. I consider this very important.

# **Proposal 3: Permitting At-Large vacancies to be filled**

Problem: Article V Part 1 subpart e, does not allow for the replacement of at-large member of the Executive Committee. The intent of the rules was to allow for such replacement.

Proposal:

Change Article V Part 1 subpart e as follows:

e. The Executive Committee shall appoint new officers and *district members* **Executive Committee members** if vacancies, not due to suspensions, occur. Such officers and Executive Committee members will complete the term of office vacated.

This should be a high priority

# **Proposal 4: Clarifying frequency of conventions**

Problem: Amongst the bulk changes to the bylaws in 2002 there were changes to add an "Annual meeting" and change terms of party leadership to just one year. We never had off year annual meetings, and failed to do so this past year.

Also the term "annual meeting" is a bit off, as it was intended as a convention in oddyears.

Plus in section 2a, there is a reference to Article V section 1f that seems to have no relevance. This may have referred to something else in another version of the bylaws, but I don't know what it was.

I think that reverting to a biennial convention, retaining the OPTION of off year conventions. (A necessary option, if the national LP decides to hold its presidential nominating convention in the odd numbered year prior to the election.)

## Proposal

# Change article VI as follows:

1. The Party shall have annual meetings of members during Spring. Notice of the Annual Meeting shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the Party website shall be considered notice of the meeting. Should said notice not be provided, a Special Meeting may be called as provided by this Article.

### 2. Conventions

a. Except as provided under Article V, Section 1f of these Bylans, the Party shall hold a Biennial Convention every two years general election year at the time and place selected by the Executive Committee. The Party may have such additional conventions as may be deemed desirable by the Executive Committee. A special Convention may be called by presenting a petition signed by 1/2 of the sustaining members of the Party, such Convention to be held within 30 days of the presentation to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall appoint a convention committee to arrange the Convention. Notice of the Convention shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said Convention. Posting of notice on the Party website shall be considered notice of the Convention.

b. Any full member attending any Convention of the Party may cast a vote as a delegate.

c. A Convention called for the purpose of nominating delegates and alternates to the national Convention shall be held within a year of the national Convention after the number of delegates is announced.

If a Biennial Convention is not called as provided under this Article by May 1 of any *convention* general election year, or if a convention for nominating delegates to the national convention is not called within 60 days of the national convention any five (5) members of the Party may call the Convention. Notice of the Convention shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said Convention. Posting of notice on the national Libertarian Party website (www.lp.org) shall be considered notice of the Convention.

## and change Article V part 1a as follows:

a. The officers of the Party shall be Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer. Term of office shall be *one year* two years. These officers shall be elected at the *Annual Meeting, Special Meeting or* Biennial Convention by the attending full members and shall take office immediately upon the close of such Meeting or Convention and serve until the final adjournment of the next Biennial Convention. All officers will be elected by a simple majority.

# **Proposal 5: Deleting obsolete paragraph**

Proposal:

Strike Article V, Part1f.:

**f.** An Organizing Officer will be selected at the organizing meeting. The Organizing Officer will have the authority to call a Convention. The Organizing Officer will chair the Convention and that position will have no further authority after the adjournment of that Convention.

Notes: This section was needed only for the "rebooting" of the party two years ago. This section serves no further purpose and ought to be deleted.

# **Proposal 6: Dual leadership conflict**

Problem: There is no provision to prevent members in leadership from serving in the leadership of another political party, a clear conflict of interest.

# Proposal:

Add the following to Article V Part 1 (officers)

#. Officers and members of the Executive Committee may not serve as an officer of, or committee member of another state or national political party. This applies to all organizations that consider themselves political parties, wether or not the state of Maine has given any official status to them or not.

#. If an individual is elected or appointed as an Officer or Executive Committee to the Party while holding a conflicting role in another party, as defined above, that individual has 90 days to resign from one position or the other. If such individual fails to do so, the position is considered vacant, and may be filled according to the rules for doing so described in Article V, Part 1 c

Notes: This is inspired out of an individual, who was serving in the state committee of another party, eventually that individual had to step down due to over-committing to too many things, thus avoiding any problems that could have come about from the conflict.

The 90 day grace period allows for conventions to elect someone who hasn't yet fully cut ties with the former party.

Also note this does not prevent individual members from having membership in another party (such as those libertarians who stay registered in major party in order to take part in primaries.

# **Proposal 7: Vice-Chair succession**

Problem: It's not clear in the bylaws that the Vice Chair becomes Chair upon the vacancy of the Chair.

change Article V Part 1d & 1e as follows:

d. Any officer of the Party may be temporarily suspended by a vote of three (3) Executive Committee members, subject to ratification by a 2/3 vote of the full members attending a special convention called for such purpose. The members will then elect a replacement officer, execpt in the case of the Chair being suspended, in which case the Vice-Chair shall become Chair, and the members shall elect a new Vice-Chair. Such officer will complete the term of office vacated.

e. The Executive Committee shall appoint new officers and district members if vacancies, not due to suspensions, occur, with the execution of the vacancy of the Chair, in which case the Vice-Chair shall become chair and the office of Vice-Chair will be appointed by the Executive Committee. Such officers and Executive Committee members will complete the term of office vacated.

This is of moderate importance, as the executive committee can choose to fill a Chair vacancy with the Vice-Chair on its own, though it is not required to.

# Proposal 8: Defining "Sustaining Member" & Requirement of it for being an officer

Problem: Without some carrot to becoming a Paid member, Maine will lose representation in national conventions as the percentage of Sustaining members (members who have signed the pledge, AND paid dues to the national party), Also ensure that leadership has some "skin in the game" invested.

Proposal: To define "Sustaining Membership" by adding...

The following part to Article IV (Membership)

#. A sustaining member is deifined as one who is a full member and has either...

- a. Paid dues to the national party as per its bylaws to be considered a sustaining member, or alternatively.
- b. Donated twice the minimum annual dues for being an national sustaining member, directly to the LPME instead.

2nd Proposal (presuming the above passes):

Add the following subpart to Article V Part 1 (Officers)

#. All Officers and Executive Committee members must be sustaining members.

#### Note

The current definition of sustaining membership for national is \$25 in donations over the calendar year. This would make the state option \$50.

The double figure is listed, as we should encourage national membership, for delegate allocation purposes, but still provide a local means of fulfilling the status, if a member has a problem with the national party, or for getting members to sustaining status on short notice, if need be.

This is not a high priority, but something I think would be a good idea.

# Proposal 9: Delegating National Platform & Credentials Committee member selection to the Executive Committee if need be.

#### Problem:

Our conventions for nominating delegates to the national convention come too late for us to choose members for the national convention's platform committee. It's highly unlikely that we will ever have a convention timed so perfectly that if we are entitled to a committee seat, that we could hold a convention after that was determined, yet before the number of delegates would be set.

Furthermore, it's there is no clear authority set for a similar choice for the credentials committee if we qualify to send someone.

## Proposal:

Amend Article IX part 3 as follows:

3. If the Party is eligible to elect a national Libertarian Party Platform Committee member, or Libertarian Party Credentials Committee member under the Rules, Constitution, or Bylaws of the national Libertarian Party, the election of such member will be by majority vote of the full members present and voting at the Convention. Voting shall be done by secret ballot. An alternate shall also be elected for this position. If the deadline for such a choice occurs before a convention can be held, the choice is to be made by a majority vote of the Executive Committee.

#### Notes:

Realistically, the chances of the LPME becoming one of the 10 largest LP chapters is incredibly slim, so as much as I'd like to make this rule change to conform with the realities of scheduling, the likelihood of this ever becoming relevant is nearly non-existent. So put this at the bottom of the barrel.

# Sample "Regulate Marijuana Like Alcohol" ordinance provided by David Boyer:

# VOTER PROPOSED ORDINANCE USE OF MARIJUANA BY PERSONS 21 YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER

A new chapter of the Code of Ordinances of the City of South Portland, Maine is enacted to read:

Section, 1. Preamble.

WHEREAS, a 1995 study commissioned by the World Health Organization concluded marijuana poses a much less serious public health problem than is currently posed by alcohol;

WHEREAS, marijuana laws are disproportionately enforced against communities of color, and according to a 2013 report produced by the American Civil Liberties Union, African-Americans in Maine are more than two times as likely to be arrested for marijuana possession as white citizens, despite similar rates of consumption;

WHEREAS, in an interview published in The New Yorker in January 2014, President Barack Obama acknowledged that marijuana is less harmful than alcohol in terms of its impact on the consumer:

WHEREAS, an assessment published in 2009 in *British Columbia's Mental Health and Addictions Journal found* health-related costs for alcohol consumers are more than eight times greater than those for marijuana consumers;

WHEREAS, according to the National Institutes of Health, more than 300 Americans die annually as the result of alcohol overdoses, and there has never been a confirmed marijuana overdose death recorded in the medical literature, as noted by the British Medical Journal in September 2003;

WHEREAS, studies conducted in 1999 by the National Academy of Sciences Institute of Medicine and 1994 by the National Institute on Drug Abuse concluded marijuana is less addictive than alcohol:

WHEREAS, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention attributes more than 30,000 American deaths per year to the health effects of alcohol and zero deaths directly to the health effects of marijuana;

WHEREAS, extensive research documented in official reports by the British government's Advisory Council on the Misuse of Drugs and the Canadian Senate Special Committee on Illegal Drugs, among others, shows that — unlike alcohol use — marijuana use is not generally a cause of violence or aggressive behavior, and, in fact, tends to reduce violence and aggression;

WHEREAS, police officers' and prosecutors' time and resources would be better spent addressing violent crimes and property crimes instead of citing and prosecuting adults 21 years of age and older for possession of small amounts of marijuana;

WHEREAS, police officers and prosecutors have the discretion to refrain from issuing citations to and filing charges against adults 21 years of age and older for possession of small amounts of marijuana; and

Therefore, in the interest of the public health and public safety, and in order to better focus law enforcement resources on crimes involving violence and personal property, the People of South Portland find and declare that the use of marijuana should be legal for persons 21 years of age or older.

- Sec. 2. Notwithstanding any other ordinance, it shall not be unlawful in South Portland, and must not be used as the basis for prosecution or penalty by South Portland for persons 21 years of age or older, to possess or use marijuana paraphernalia or one ounce or less of marijuana, except that it is not lawful for a person to:
- (a) use or display marijuana or marijuana paraphernalia in a public place; or
- (b) operate, navigate, or be in actual physical control of any motor vehicle, aircraft, or motorboat while under the influence of marijuana.
- Sec. 3. The City of South Portland, through adoption of this ordinance, resolves to support a change in state law to tax and regulate the sale of marijuana in a manner similar to alcohol.

# The new state law on state recognition of political parties by enrollment:

#### **Maine Revised Statutes**

Title 21-A: ELECTIONS

**Chapter 5: NOMINATIONS** 

#### §303. FORMATION OF NEW PARTY; ORGANIZATION BY PARTY ENROLLMENT

In addition to the procedure under section 302, a party whose designation was not listed on the general election ballot in the last preceding general election qualifies to participate in a primary election if it meets the requirements of subsections 1 and 2. [2013, c. 131, §11 (AMD).]

- 1. **Declaration of intent.** Ten or more voters who are not enrolled in a party qualified under section 301 must file a declaration of intent to form a party with the Secretary of State between December 1st and December 30th of an even-numbered year. The declaration of intent must be on a form designed by the Secretary of State and must include:
  - A. The designation of the proposed party; and [1985, c. 161, §6 (NEW).]
  - B. The names, addresses, telephone numbers, if published, and signatures of the voters who file the declaration of intent. [1997, c. 436, §44 (AMD).]

[2013, c. 131, §11 (AMD).]

2. Enrollment of voters. Within 5 business days after the declaration of intent required in subsection 1 is filed, the Secretary of State shall certify whether the application meets the requirements of subsection 1 and notify the applicants that they may enroll voters in the proposed party under sections 141 to 145. On or before December 1st of the odd-numbered year following the filing of the application under subsection 1, the applicants must file a certification with the Secretary of State, on a form designed by the Secretary of State, that they have at least 5,000 voters enrolled in the proposed party. The Secretary of State shall verify the proposed party's enrollment figures within 5 business days of receiving the proposed party's certification and notify the applicants whether the proposed party has met the requirements to participate in a primary election in the subsequent even-numbered year.

[ 2013, c. 131, §11 (AMD) .]

**4. Municipal caucuses.** A party that has qualified under subsections 1 and 2 to participate in a primary election must conduct municipal caucuses in at least one municipality in each of the 16 counties during that election year as prescribed in Article 2. The chair of the municipal committee or a resident voter in the municipality must file a copy of the notice required by section 311, subsection 3 with the Secretary of State before 5 p.m. on March 20th.

[2013, c. 131, §11 (AMD).]

**5. Convention.** A party that has qualified under subsections 1 and 2 to participate in a primary election must in that same year conduct the municipal caucuses under subsection 4 and hold a state convention as prescribed by Article 3, in order to have the party designation of its candidates printed on the ballot in the general election of that year. The voters who file the declaration of intent may perform the duties of the state committee under section 321, subsection 1 for the party's initial convention.

# Proposed changes to the LPME Bylaws

In example language, **bold & underlined** text is language being added by the proposal; **italicized and struck-through text** is language being removed by the proposal.

# Proposals 1-2. Eliminate References to an "Annual Meeting" that is no longer defined.

**Problem:** At the 2012 convention, the bylaws were changed to eliminate an "Annual Meeting". However, references to the non-existent type of meeting remained.

Therefore, we need to eliminate all references to an "Annual Meeting" through the following changes:

**Proposal 1:** In Article V, Part 6 (Exhaustion) the final sentence shall be amended as follows:

Until it is replaced via Elections at a Convention, Annual Meeting or Special Meeting under Article VI of these Bylaws, the Interim Executive Committee shall have all powers and bear all responsibilities of the regular Executive Committee.

Proposal 2: Article XI, Part 1 shall be amended as follows:

I. These Bylaws may be amended by a 2/3 vote of the members voting on that particular issue at any Biennial Convention,—Annual Meeting or Special Meeting.

#### Notes:

This is just janitorial cleaning up after last convention's changes.

# Proposal 3. Change the last Annual Meeting reference to a preserve the intent of the part.

**Problem**: The "Special Meeting" was created as a safety valve in case party leadership failed to call for any conventions, or if enough executive committee members dropped off the radar so that getting a quorum to call for a convention would be impossible. It was created at the same time as the concept of the "Annual Meeting" and the deadline for the executive committee to act was based on the timing of calling for an "Annual Meeting"

So in addition to striking the reference to an Annual Meeting, we need to tie the ability to call a special meeting to some event that fails to occur.

Proposal: Article VI, Part 2 shall be amended as follows:

If an Annual Meeting a Biennial Convention is not called as provided under this Article by June I of any non-convention year even numbered year, any five (5) members of the Party may call a Special Meeting. Notice of the Special Meeting shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the national Libertarian Party website (www.lp.org) shall be considered notice of the meeting. New Officers will be elected at the Special Meeting, and other business will be conducted as required.

#### Notes:

The need for the removal of the Annual Meeting reference is clear for the same reason as proposals 1 & 2. The text substituted is chosen as a reasonable substitute.

If a state party convention doesn't occur by that point, we would miss out on our ability to send delegates to that year's national convention. If we have party ballot access, we would lose it by failing to hold a convention.

Since such an event (or more precisely a lack of an event) would be clearly an abdication of responsibility of the Executive Committee, requiring a new one be elected. It is not so soon as to create a means of coup by bylaws. But not so late as to leave the party in limbo for too long.

# Proposals 4-6 - Clarifying the process of adding delegates to the national convention.

**Background**: The credentials committee of the national convention needs clear and unambiguous rules from each state as to how their delegations are to be selected. The credentials committee has encouraged states to have changes to the delegation submitted over a week prior to the convention. As last minute, or mid-convention changes are time consuming, and potentially controversial.

Since Maine rarely fills out its delegation, we traditionally have given the head of delegation the ability to add people to the roster of Maine delegates at the national convention.

**Problem**: The language says "At the convention", it implies that the head of delegation cannot make changes until the convention itself opens. To be able to add delegates before then, we'd need to alter the language.

Proposal 4: Article IX, Part five shall be amended as follows:

5. Prior to and at At the National Convention, the elected delegation head may select additional people to fill open delegate positions.

To clarify that these additions are to serve only to fill unassigned seats, and that the elected delegates are to be seated ahead of these additions, the following is proposed

Proposal 5: Article IX, Part five shall be amended as follows:

5. At the National Convention, the elected delegation head may select additional people to **fill open delegate positions.** be alternate delegates.

Problem: Traditionally, we have allowed Libertarians from other states to be Maine alternate delegates. This occurs in some states who have more people who want to be delegates than have seats at the convention. However changes to bylaws in 2012 defined members as having to be from Maine, and that delegates must be members. To preserve this, we'd have to add language to allow for it.

Proposal 6: Add the following new part to Article IX

6. Alternate delegates added by the delegation head, may be residents of locales other than Maine, so long as they are Sustaining Members of the national Libertarian Party.

# Proposal 7: Defining right to be a voting member at the state convention to prevent a casual takeover.

**Background**: In the 90's the New York Libertarian Party nominated radio personality Howard Stern for Governor of New York.

However the majority of voting members at the nominating convention had only just joined the party that day, for the purpose of nominating Stern. Some of the party leadership told Stern he could do this as a way of bypassing the need to gain the approval of the existing members. This is all chronicled by Stern in a chapter in his book "Miss America".

The convention was turned into a circus, and eventually Stern dropped out of the race, leaving the LPNY in worse shape.

As a result, some states have put in measures to prevent such a casual "walk-up, sign-up, take-over" of a convention. But one doesn't want to put too heavy a restriction as it discourages new members to participate.

**Proposal**: Article VI, Part 1 b shall be amended as follows:

b. Any <u>full\_sustaining</u> member attending any Convention of the Party may cast a vote as a delegate. <u>Any full member in attendance may cast a vote</u>, if they register for the convention at least 6 days prior to the convention.

# Bylaws of the Libertarian Party of Maine, Inc.

As amended at the Libertarian Party of Maine 2012 Convention on March 31st, 2012

#### ARTICI F I - Name

The name of the corporation shall be the "Libertarian Party of Maine, Inc.", hereinafter referred to as the "Party".

# ARTICLE II – Purpose

The purpose of the Party is to implement and give voice to the libertarian principles such as those in the "Statement of Principles" of the Libertarian Party of the United States by:

- a. Promoting candidates for public office within Maine;
- b. Working for the election of the national Libertarian Party nominee for President and Vice-President;
- c. Promoting, chartering and coordinating affiliate parties throughout the State of Maine;
- d. Entering into informational and educational activities;
- e. Supporting or opposing referenda, ballot initiatives, citizen vetoes, and other ballot questions; and
- f. Engaging in any and all additional activities necessary and proper to advance the "Statement of Principles" and the cause of Liberty in America.

# ARTICLE III - Principles

The Party shall always act in accordance with the "Statement of Principles" of the national Libertarian Party.

# ARTICLE IV – Membership

- Full members of the Party shall be those persons residing in Maine, who have certified
  in writing that they oppose the initiation of force to achieve political or social goals.
  This certification may be submitted to either the national Libertarian Party, or the
  Libertarian Party of Maine
- 2. Membership in the Party is not to be restricted by a person's race, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, or residency.
- 3. There are no dues or fees charged or levied to become a full member of the Party. Voluntary contributions are accepted. A person may become an "enrolled" member of the Party in accordance with state law.
- 4. A sustaining member is defined as one who is a full member and has either...

- a. Paid dues to the national party as per its bylaws to be considered a sustaining member, or alternatively.
- b. Donated the minimum annual dues for being a national sustaining member, directly to the LPME instead.

# ARTICLE V – Organization

#### 1. Officers

- a. The officers of the Party shall be Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer. Term of office shall be two years. These officers shall be elected at the Biennial Convention by the attending full members and shall take office immediately upon the close of such Meeting or Convention and serve until the final adjournment of the next Meeting or Convention. All officers will be elected by a simple majority.
- b. No offices shall be combined.
- c. The officers shall have such powers and perform such duties as are delegated by the Executive Committee and are not inconsistent with the provisions of these Bylaws, and the laws of the State of Maine.
- d. Any officer of the Party may be temporarily suspended by a vote of three (3) Executive Committee members, subject to ratification by a 2/3 vote of the full members attending a special convention called for such purpose. The members will then elect a replacement officer, except in the case of the Chair being suspended, in which case the Vice-Chair shall become Chair, and the members shall elect a new Vice-Chair. Such officer will complete the term of office vacated.
- e. The Executive Committee shall appoint new officers and Executive Committee members if vacancies, not due to suspensions, occur, with the exception of the vacancy of the Chair, in which case the Vice-Chair shall become chair and the office of Vice-Chair will be appointed by the Executive Committee. Such officers and Executive Committee members will complete the term of office vacated.
- f. Officers and members of the Executive Committee may not serve as an officer of, or committee member of another state or national political party. This applies to all organizations that consider themselves political parties, whether or not the state of Maine has given any official status to them
- g. If an individual is elected or appointed as an Officer or Executive Committee member to the Party while holding a conflicting role in another party, as defined above, that individual has 90 days to resign from one position or the other. If such individual fails to do so, the position is considered vacant, and may be filled according to the rules for doing so described in Article V, Part 1 e
- h. All Officers and Executive Committee members must be sustaining members.

#### 2. Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is the Board of Directors for the purposes of the Maine Nonprofit Corporation Act, and shall be responsible for the control and management of all the affairs, properties, and funds of the Party consistent with these Bylaws. The Executive Committee shall meet at such times and places as may be determined by the committee, by call of the chair, or by the written request of any two (2) members of the committee. More than one half of the membership thereof shall constitute a quorum at all meetings. The Executive Committee by majority vote may agree to allow absentee ballots by mail or telephone. No secret meeting will be held by the Executive Committee; all meetings will be open to all Party members.

The Executive Committee shall meet at least four (4) times per calendar year. Notice of all Executive Committee meetings shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the Party website shall be considered notice of the meeting.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the following:

- a. The four elected officers of the party;
- b. Two district members, one from each Congressional district; and
- c. One At-Large member.
- 3. The district and affiliate party members shall serve as the "district" and "county" committees when required under state law.
- 4. Affiliate Parties The Executive Committee shall have the power to charter and set the geographical area of affiliate parties.
- 5. Judicial Committee. A Judicial Committee may be formed. The Judicial Committee shall be composed of five (5) full members appointed by the Executive Committee. The term of a member of the Judicial Committee shall run through the period of the next Party convention and until a successor is appointed. No officer of the Party may serve on the Judicial Committee. The Judicial Committee shall be the final body of appeal in all matters regarding interpretation of the Bylaws, Rules, or Resolutions of the Party subject to the provision that a decision of the Committee may be overturned by a 2/3 vote of a convention.
- 6. Exhaustion. In the event that all Executive Committee positions become vacant, former Executive Committee members who are willing and qualified to be members of the Executive Committee shall constitute themselves as the Interim Executive Committee. They shall promptly act as described in this Article to fill positions on the Executive Committee. Until it is replaced via Elections at a Convention, Annual Meeting or Special Meeting under Article VI of these Bylaws, the Interim Executive Committee shall have all powers and bear all responsibilities of the regular Executive Committee.

# ARTICLE VI - Special Meeting and Conventions

1. Conventions

- a. The Party shall hold a Biennial Convention every general election year at the time and place selected by the Executive Committee. The Party may have such additional conventions as may be deemed desirable by the Executive Committee. A special Convention may be called by presenting a petition signed by 10% of the sustaining members of the Party, such Convention to be held within 30 days of the presentation to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall appoint a convention committee to arrange the Convention. Notice of the Convention shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said Convention. Posting of notice on the Party website, and via direct mail to all members shall be considered notice of the Convention.
- b. Any full member attending any Convention of the Party may cast a vote as a delegate.
- c. A Convention called for the purpose of nominating delegates and alternates to the national Convention shall be held within a year of the national Convention after the number of delegates is announced.

#### 2. Special Meeting

If an Annual Meeting is not called as provided under this Article by June 1 of any non-convention year, any five (5) members of the Party may call a Special Meeting. Notice of the Special Meeting shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the national Libertarian Party website (www.lp.org) shall be considered notice of the meeting. New Officers will be elected at the Special Meeting, and other business will be conducted as required.

## ARTICLE VII – Platform

- 1. The Party may adopt a platform. The platform shall include, but need not be limited to, the Libertarian Party's National Committee's "Statement of Principles" and the implementation of the principles contained in the "Statement" in the form of planks.
- 2. The Executive Committee shall appoint a Platform Committee whose responsibility it is to write and submit said submit said platform to the Convention for approval on a plank by plank basis by a 2/3 majority of the delegates present and voting at the Convention.

## ARTICI F VIII - None of the Above

- Votes cast for "None of the Above" in voting on the Party's candidates for delegates to national Libertarian Party conventions, representatives to the national Libertarian Party platform committee, and for the four Party officers shall be considered valid and properly recorded.
- 2. Should "None of the Above" receive a majority for an officer, another election for that office shall be called.

# ARTICLE IX – Election of delegates to Libertarian Party National Conventions

- 1. All delegates and alternates shall be full members.
- 2. Delegates and alternates shall be elected by full members in attendance at the Party's convention in the year of the Libertarian Party National Convention.

- a. The first step in electing delegates shall be to receive any number of seconded nominations.
- b. The Party Convention attendants shall then vote by secret ballot for "acceptable" nominees of their choice. Delegates may also indicate "unacceptable" nominees.
- c. Only those nominees receiving more "acceptable" votes than "unacceptable" votes shall be delegates or alternates. They shall be ranked in order of number of "acceptable" votes received.
- d. Should there be more winners than slots allocated by the National Libertarian Party those with the most "acceptable" votes shall be delegates and those remaining shall be alternates.
- e. In case of ties for the last regular delegate slots, all those tied shall be ranked by voting Party Convention attendees. Those with the highest rank sum are regular delegates. Further ties shall be resolved by the Chair.
- f. The next ranking alternate, as determined by the Chair, shall become a regular delegate in case a regular cannot attend the Libertarian Party National Convention. Other alternates shall substitute for regular delegates on the National Convention floor.
- 3. If the Party is eligible to elect a national Libertarian Party Platform Committee, or Libertarian Party Credentials Committee member, member under the Rules, Constitution, or Bylaws of the national Libertarian Party, the election of such member will be by majority vote of the full members present and voting at the Convention. Voting shall be done by secret ballot. An alternate shall also be elected for this position. If the deadline for such a choice occurs before a convention can be held, the choice is to be made by a majority vote of the Executive Committee.
- 4. The head of the delegation shall be nominated and elected by the convention from among the persons who have been elected as delegates. An alternate head shall also be elected.
- 5. At the National Convention, the elected delegation head may select additional people to fill open delegate positions.

# ARTICLE X – Parliamentary Authority

Roberts Rules of Order-Newly Revised shall be the parliamentary authority for all matters or procedure not specifically covered by the Bylaws of the Party.

## ARTICLE XI - Amendments

- 1. These Bylaws may be amended by a 2/3 vote of the members voting on that particular issue at any Biennial Convention, Annual Meeting or Special Meeting.
- 2. Article IV, 2, Article V, 1.d, , and this Article shall not be amended or suspended without a 7/8 vote.

# **Proposed Platform:**

The Libertarian Party supports reducing the size, scope and power of government at all levels and on all issues, and opposes increasing the size, scope or power of government at any level or for any purpose.

# **Proposed changes to the LPME Bylaws**

In example language, **bold & underlined** text is language being added by the proposal; **italicized and struck-through text** is language being removed by the proposal.

# Proposal 1. Rename current Executive Committee, the State Committee

**Problem:** State law requires the party have a "State Committee".

Renaming the current Executive Committee to be the State Committee will remedy this. This will also free up the term "Executive Committee" so that it may serve as it normally is used in organizations, a smaller subset of the main committee to make important decisions in a quicker manner, within authority granted by the larger body.

**Proposal 1:** Throughout the entire bylaws, replace all instances of "Executive Committee" with "State Committee

Notes:

Due to the numerous changes this causes, the full altered text is not shown here.

# **Proposal 2. Defining District and County Committees**

**Problem**: State Law requires that parties have District and County committees, current bylaws address this vaguely and so broadly as to make any meetings nearly impossible, if needed.

District committees are rarely needed, so defining them as the state committee members from the respective districts, with the district representative being the district chair should suffice.

County committees, however, can serve a real purpose in organizing on a more local level, and enable those who wish to participate in the party not to immediately have work on a statewide level. The vague rules on creating

**Proposal**: In Article V, Parts 3 and 4 shall be amended as follows:

- 3. The district and affiliate party members shall serve as the "district" and "county" committees when required under state law. District

  Committees
  - a. District Committees for each congressional district shall consist of the members of the State Committee.
  - b. Each committee will be chaired by it's representative on the State Committee
  - c. If there is no current representative for a district on the State Committee. the members of the District Committee will elect one from their membership, when needed.
- 4. Affiliate Parties The Executive Committee shall have the power to charter and set the geographical area of affiliate parties. County Committees
  - a. If a county does not have a recognized committee at the time of a state convention, For the purposes of state law:
    - i. The membership of the County Committee shall be the party's Sustaining Members residing in that county.
      ii. The Chair of the County Committee shall be the State Committee district representative of the district the county predominantly sits in.
  - b. The State Committee shall create rules for the formation and affiliation of a county committee.
  - c. The Chair of a recognized County Committee serves as a member of the State Committee, with the Vice-Chair of that County Committee serving as an alternate.

d. Members of a County Committee must be Full Members of the party, and reside in that county.

# Proposal 3: Allow for nomination of candidates at convention.

**Problem**: There is no provision for the party nominating candidates. We have previously only concerned ourselves with the formal process of getting candidates on the ballot, according to state law.

But if we gain recognized party status outside of the primary season, and it is permitted, we need to be able to nominate at convention.

A nomination at convention procedure can also serve us well if we still are getting ballot access via petitioning, if multiple candidates are seeking to run for the same office as Libertarians, or if an individual is misrepresenting themselves on the ballot as a Libertarian.

**Proposal**: Create a new Article XII as follows:

#### **ARTICLE XII: Nomination of Candidates**

Candidates for statewide races, state legislative races, and U.S. Congressional district races, may be nominated at the biennial convention, or any special convention called by the State Committee for such a purpose. Any candidate so nominated must be a Full Member.

Note: The language is in part, derived from the Libertarian Party of Indiana's bylaws.

# **Proposal 4: Create an Assistant Treasurer position**

**Problem**: The position of Treasurer is a critical one, and must be filled at all times. If a Treasurer resigns or lapses in their responsibilities, a clear backup is needed..

Proposal: Amend Article V Part 1 section a as follows:

**a.** The officers of the Party shall be Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, **and** Treasurer, **and Assistant Treasurer**. Term of office shall be two years. These officers shall be elected at the Biennial Convention by the attending full members and shall take office immediately upon the close of such Meeting or Convention and serve until the final adjournment of the next Meeting or Convention. All officers will be elected by a simple majority.

Note: The national Libertarian Party has had this problem on several occasions, and now has the position of Assistant Treasurer for just this purpose, although it is an appointed position there.

# Proposal 5: Cleaning up the rules on vacancies

**Problem**: With an assistant treasurer, and county chairs being created as members of the state committee, the language on vacancies needs to be cleaned up and broken into separate sections.

Proposal: Amend Article V Part 1 section e as follows

e. The Executive Committee shall appoint new officers and Executive Committee members if vacancies, not due to suspensions, occur, with the exception of the vacancy of the Chair, in which case the Vice-Chair shall become chair and the office of Vice-Chair will be appointed by the Executive Committee. Such officers and Executive Committee members will complete the term of office vacated. The State Committee shall appoint new officers if any of the positions of Vice-Chair, Secretary, Assistant Treasurer, District Members or At-Large Members of the State Committee, if vacancies, not due to suspensions, occur.

(new section)f. If the position of Chair is vacated, the Vice-Chair becomes chair, and the position of Vice-Chair is appointed by the State Committee

(new section)g. If the position of Treasurer is vacated, the Assistant Treasurer becomes Treasurer, and the position of Assistant Treasurer is appointed by the State Committee

and subsequent sections are re-lettered appropriately.

# **Proposal 6: Let the Treasurer be the "Finance Chair"**

**Problem**: It's not clear if having such a position is a requirement of the law, but state election law does occasionally refer to a party "Finance Chair".

**Proposal**: Amend Article V Part 1 to add the following section:

k. Unless the State Committee appoints a Finance Chair, the Treasurer shall serve as the Finance Chair of the party.

Note: Better safe than sorry.

# Bylaws of the Libertarian Party of Maine, Inc.

As amended at the Libertarian Party of Maine Convention on June 7th, 2014

## ARTICLE I - Name

The name of the corporation shall be the "Libertarian Party of Maine, Inc.", hereinafter referred to as the "Party".

# ARTICLE II – Purpose

The purpose of the Party is to implement and give voice to the libertarian principles such as those in the "Statement of Principles" of the Libertarian Party of the United States by:

- a. Promoting candidates for public office within Maine;
- b. Working for the election of the national Libertarian Party nominee for President and Vice-President;
- c. Promoting, chartering and coordinating affiliate parties throughout the State of Maine;
- d. Entering into informational and educational activities;
- e. Supporting or opposing referenda, ballot initiatives, citizen vetoes, and other ballot questions; and
- f. Engaging in any and all additional activities necessary and proper to advance the "Statement of Principles" and the cause of Liberty in America.

# ARTICLE III - Principles

The Party shall always act in accordance with the "Statement of Principles" of the national Libertarian Party.

# ARTICLE IV – Membership

- Full members of the Party shall be those persons residing in Maine, who have certified
  in writing that they oppose the initiation of force to achieve political or social goals.
  This certification may be submitted to either the national Libertarian Party, or the
  Libertarian Party of Maine
- 2. Membership in the Party is not to be restricted by a person's race, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, or residency.
- 3. There are no dues or fees charged or levied to become a full member of the Party. Voluntary contributions are accepted. A person may become an "enrolled" member of the Party in accordance with state law.
- 4. A sustaining member is defined as one who is a full member and has either...

- a. Paid dues to the national party as per its bylaws to be considered a sustaining member, or alternatively.
- b. Donated the minimum annual dues for being a national sustaining member, directly to the LPME instead.

# ARTICLE V – Organization

#### 1. Officers

- a. The officers of the Party shall be Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer. Term of office shall be two years. These officers shall be elected at the Biennial Convention by the attending full members and shall take office immediately upon the close of such Meeting or Convention and serve until the final adjournment of the next Meeting or Convention. All officers will be elected by a simple majority.
- b. No offices shall be combined.
- c. The officers shall have such powers and perform such duties as are delegated by the Executive Committee and are not inconsistent with the provisions of these Bylaws, and the laws of the State of Maine.
- d. Any officer of the Party may be temporarily suspended by a vote of three (3) Executive Committee members, subject to ratification by a 2/3 vote of the full members attending a special convention called for such purpose. The members will then elect a replacement officer, except in the case of the Chair being suspended, in which case the Vice-Chair shall become Chair, and the members shall elect a new Vice-Chair. Such officer will complete the term of office vacated.
- e. The Executive Committee shall appoint new officers and Executive Committee members if vacancies, not due to suspensions, occur, with the exception of the vacancy of the Chair, in which case the Vice-Chair shall become chair and the office of Vice-Chair will be appointed by the Executive Committee. Such officers and Executive Committee members will complete the term of office vacated.
- f. Officers and members of the Executive Committee may not serve as an officer of, or committee member of another state or national political party. This applies to all organizations that consider themselves political parties, whether or not the state of Maine has given any official status to them
- g. If an individual is elected or appointed as an Officer or Executive Committee member to the Party while holding a conflicting role in another party, as defined above, that individual has 90 days to resign from one position or the other. If such individual fails to do so, the position is considered vacant, and may be filled according to the rules for doing so described in Article V, Part 1 e
- h. All Officers and Executive Committee members must be sustaining members.

#### 2. Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is the Board of Directors for the purposes of the Maine Nonprofit Corporation Act, and shall be responsible for the control and management of all the affairs, properties, and funds of the Party consistent with these Bylaws. The Executive Committee shall meet at such times and places as may be determined by the committee, by call of the chair, or by the written request of any two (2) members of the committee. More than one half of the membership thereof shall constitute a quorum at all meetings. The Executive Committee by majority vote may agree to allow absentee ballots by mail or telephone. No secret meeting will be held by the Executive Committee; all meetings will be open to all Party members.

The Executive Committee shall meet at least four (4) times per calendar year. Notice of all Executive Committee meetings shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the Party website shall be considered notice of the meeting.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the following:

- a. The four elected officers of the party;
- b. Two district members, one from each Congressional district; and
- c. One At-Large member.
- 3. The district and affiliate party members shall serve as the "district" and "county" committees when required under state law.
- 4. Affiliate Parties The Executive Committee shall have the power to charter and set the geographical area of affiliate parties.
- 5. Judicial Committee. A Judicial Committee may be formed. The Judicial Committee shall be composed of five (5) full members appointed by the Executive Committee. The term of a member of the Judicial Committee shall run through the period of the next Party convention and until a successor is appointed. No officer of the Party may serve on the Judicial Committee. The Judicial Committee shall be the final body of appeal in all matters regarding interpretation of the Bylaws, Rules, or Resolutions of the Party subject to the provision that a decision of the Committee may be overturned by a 2/3 vote of a convention.
- 6. Exhaustion. In the event that all Executive Committee positions become vacant, former Executive Committee members who are willing and qualified to be members of the Executive Committee shall constitute themselves as the Interim Executive Committee. They shall promptly act as described in this Article to fill positions on the Executive Committee. Until it is replaced via Elections at a Convention or Special Meeting under Article VI of these Bylaws, the Interim Executive Committee shall have all powers and bear all responsibilities of the regular Executive Committee.

# ARTICLE VI - Special Meeting and Conventions

1. Conventions

- a. The Party shall hold a Biennial Convention every general election year at the time and place selected by the Executive Committee. The Party may have such additional conventions as may be deemed desirable by the Executive Committee. A special Convention may be called by presenting a petition signed by 10% of the sustaining members of the Party, such Convention to be held within 30 days of the presentation to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall appoint a convention committee to arrange the Convention. Notice of the Convention shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said Convention. Posting of notice on the Party website, and via direct mail to all members shall be considered notice of the Convention.
- b. Any sustaining member attending any Convention of the Party may cast a vote as a delegate.
- c. A Convention called for the purpose of nominating delegates and alternates to the national Convention shall be held within a year of the national Convention after the number of delegates is announced. Any full member in attendance may cast a vote, if they register for the convention at least 6 days prior to the convention

#### 2. Special Meeting

If a Biennial Convention is not called as provided under this Article by June 1 of any even numbered year, any five (5) members of the Party may call a Special Meeting. Notice of the Special Meeting shall be given not less than fourteen (14) days prior to said meeting. Posting of meeting notice on the national Libertarian Party website (www.lp.org) shall be considered notice of the meeting. New Officers will be elected at the Special Meeting, and other business will be conducted as required.

### ARTICLE VII - Platform

- 1. The Party may adopt a platform. The platform shall include, but need not be limited to, the Libertarian Party's National Committee's "Statement of Principles" and the implementation of the principles contained in the "Statement" in the form of planks.
- 2. The Executive Committee shall appoint a Platform Committee whose responsibility it is to write and submit said submit said platform to the Convention for approval on a plank by plank basis by a 2/3 majority of the delegates present and voting at the Convention.

## ARTICLE VIII - None of the Above

- Votes cast for "None of the Above" in voting on the Party's candidates for delegates to national Libertarian Party conventions, representatives to the national Libertarian Party platform committee, and for the four Party officers shall be considered valid and properly recorded.
- 2. Should "None of the Above" receive a majority for an officer, another election for that office shall be called.

# ARTICLE IX – Election of delegates to Libertarian Party National Conventions

1. All delegates and alternates shall be full members.

- 2. Delegates and alternates shall be elected by full members in attendance at the Party's convention in the year of the Libertarian Party National Convention.
  - a. The first step in electing delegates shall be to receive any number of seconded nominations.
  - b. The Party Convention attendants shall then vote by secret ballot for "acceptable" nominees of their choice. Delegates may also indicate "unacceptable" nominees.
  - c. Only those nominees receiving more "acceptable" votes than "unacceptable" votes shall be delegates or alternates. They shall be ranked in order of number of "acceptable" votes received.
  - d. Should there be more winners than slots allocated by the National Libertarian Party those with the most "acceptable" votes shall be delegates and those remaining shall be alternates.
  - e. In case of ties for the last regular delegate slots, all those tied shall be ranked by voting Party Convention attendees. Those with the highest rank sum are regular delegates. Further ties shall be resolved by the Chair.
  - f. The next ranking alternate, as determined by the Chair, shall become a regular delegate in case a regular cannot attend the Libertarian Party National Convention. Other alternates shall substitute for regular delegates on the National Convention floor.
- 3. If the Party is eligible to elect a national Libertarian Party Platform Committee, or Libertarian Party Credentials Committee member, member under the Rules, Constitution, or Bylaws of the national Libertarian Party, the election of such member will be by majority vote of the full members present and voting at the Convention. Voting shall be done by secret ballot. An alternate shall also be elected for this position. If the deadline for such a choice occurs before a convention can be held, the choice is to be made by a majority vote of the Executive Committee.
- 4. The head of the delegation shall be nominated and elected by the convention from among the persons who have been elected as delegates. An alternate head shall also be elected.
- 5. Prior to and at the National Convention, the elected delegation head may select additional people to be alternate delegates.
- 6. Alternate delegates added by the delegation head, may be residents of locales other than Maine, so long as they are Sustaining Members of the national Libertarian Party.

# ARTICLE X - Parliamentary Authority

Roberts Rules of Order-Newly Revised shall be the parliamentary authority for all matters or procedure not specifically covered by the Bylaws of the Party.

## ARTICLE XI - Amendments

- 1. These Bylaws may be amended by a 2/3 vote of the members voting on that particular issue at any Biennial Convention or Special Meeting.
- 2. Article IV, 2, Article V, 1.d, , and this Article shall not be amended or suspended without a 7/8 vote.

#### How long have you been a dues paying member of National?

2008- present, currently lifetime member

#### Are you involved with your state or local party? How so?

I had an extensive history of involvement in the Libertarian Party of New Mexico from 2008-2017.

I am a lifetime member of the Libertarian Party of California, my husband's home state.

In 2018, I was appointed to the Developmental Disabilities Planning Council by former New Mexico Governor Susanna Martinez, and I was reappointed by present Governor Michelle Lujan-Grisham. I am the only registered Libertarian who is a political appointee to such a state board, where I promote liberty for people with developmental disabilities, who often lose their rights through misunderstanding of their condition. I am the chair of the DDPC's Rulemaking Committee, where I promote the individual liberty of individuals with disability.

# Have you ever served on a similar committee before? Do you have any reports or finished products you can refer the LNC to? What are your specific qualifications to serve on this particular committee?

As a member and chair of the Rulemaking Committee of the DDPC, I am involved in creating recommendations and proposing legislation to protect the rights of individuals with developmental disability. Our committee is not a decision-making body, so we do not have final say over internal rules or external legislation. Nor do I own those documents. I wrote extensively about these issues in my dissertation, and can provide excerpts. I can provide recommendations from the chair of the Council as well as the Deputy Director.

#### What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

I am interested in changing special convention rules for the election of at-large national committee members and judicial committee members to allow for a smooth tabulation process. At the last convention, the delegates did not elect some of the national committee--they were appointed by the national committee when time ran out for these elections. The same was true for some of the Judicial Committee members. I do not have specific language, because I do not know--and the delegates were never told--why this procedure takes more time than allocated. Either we must allocate more time, or we must change the counting procedures. These are matters for committee discussion. However, in the age of computers, the need for the secretary/appointed tellers to review the vote for long periods of time, only to need another vote, is maddening and the arbitrary appointment makes the LNC too powerful over the delegates. I would call for some preliminary research on this issue to then be discussed by the committee.

#### Have you read the Statement of Principles? Do you agree with it?

Yes, I have read it many times, and at one time had memorized it for my libertarian homeschooling in the late 1970s. I agree with it, and I wish to see our national candidates held to it, as provided in the bylaws.

#### Will you commit to show up and actively participate in committee email discussions and any in-person meetings?

Yes. I will establish a special e-mail address in order to keep up with discussions online and I will come to in person meetings.

#### Which national conventions have you attended?

Several as a child in the 1970s--non-delegate. As an adult delegate: 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018

# What is your position on committee transparency (should all meetings and emails be open to observation by Party members or should there be limitations)?

I think committee meetings should be entirely transparent. Sustaining members have every right to know what committees are doing and observe the proceedings. There is no reason why any by-laws and rules committee meeting should be closed to observation by interested party members.

#### Please give a brief (a few sentences) summary of your understanding of Libertarian philosophy.

All individuals have the right to life, liberty, and property (pursuit of happiness). The only legitimate government, should it exist, is one that limits its power to protecting such rights. Within these limitations, libertarians may have good-faith disagreements on how to limit a government that has vastly infringed on those rights, however, no candidate or party official should get away with proposing or supporting policies that violate these principles. Furthermore, not everyone who claims to be a libertarian is necessarily a Libertarian. One cannot be a Libertarian and espouse violations of the liberty of others for reasons of political or social expediency.

#### (optional) What are some of your most important accomplishments?

- 1. I am a polymath and pursued educational credentials in Geography-Geology, Ecology and Evolution, Neurobiology and Psychology, and Education. I completed my dissertation using a libertarian critique despite opposition from some members of my committee. I financed my own education.
- 2. When post-docs in my field were not being awarded to people with Autism/AS at University Centers on Excellence in Developmental Disabilities, I developed a campaign with others to redress this wrong, and I campaigned for and designed the first ever post-doc in Autism Policy at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine. I am the first person with ASD to hold that new post-doctoral fellowship, and I continue to participate in the design of this unique post-doc.
- 3. I am the first Libertarian to be appointed by first a Republican and then a Democrat governor to service on the Developmental Disabilities Planning Council in New Mexico, and I currently chair the Rules Committee for this political, statewide board.

#### (optional) What kind of people annoy you the most, and how do you deal with them?

I have some communication difficulties and a movement disorder, and I am annoyed by people who finish my sentences because I am slow of speech. I am learning to assert my right to finish my sentences and not let others do so.

I am uploading my academic CV. It does not include my Libertarian commitments, which I described in this application. However, it shows the level of commitment I bring to my work in many fields.

The purpose of this proposed change is to reduce ambiguity concerning when notice for a session must be posted and to ensure that all concerned individuals are provided with timely notice of a session so that they can make the proper arrangements.

The original language of this section used the word "promptly" to set a deadline, and therefore could be interpreted differently by reasonable people. The LP rules should be as clear and definite as possible so as to avoid conflict and confusion.

Apparently the committee application forms went offline at midnight Eastern time, but here on the west coast it is still October 15th, so I'm submitting my committee applications this way.

How long have you been a dues paying member of National?

23 years, and a life member for 13 years

Are you involved with your state or local party? How so?

I have recently focused more on local activism than holding state/local party positions, but am always at state conventions. Most of the LNC is well aware that I have a very long history of party service in county, state, and national positions. I won't make you read it all.

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Have you ever served on a similar committee before? Do you have any reports or finished products you can refer the LNC to? What are your specific qualifications to serve on this particular committee?

Yes, I have served on this committee several times before, as well as the Platform Committee.

Clear writing is critical when it comes to bylaws. As a detail-oriented person and a Professional Registered Parliamentarian, I have an eye for editing proposals to use proper and consistent terminology, minimize unintended consequences, and to remove ambiguity so as to minimize future disputes about interpretation.

I have sufficient experience in the party to know how our processes work and how to implement new ideas.

When I applied for the 2014 committee, I submitted ideas for 4 different proposals, 3 of which became part of the committee report and were adopted by the delegates. The 2016 delegates adopted my proposal aimed at reducing the number of human errors in our elections. I contribute to proposals authored by others by catching technical details or offering other design improvements.

What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

Several opportunities exist to address things that have burned floor time at past conventions. Our rules could use some clarification on how to handle the situation in which a bylaw proposal from the committee fails, then floor amendments are offered but they all fail. Then do we go back and vote again on the unamended proposal, or argue about procedure for 30 minutes? This is a recurring debate. During the last convention there was a lot of confusion, which cost a lot of convention floor time, over the handling of multiple minority reports. We need to find a way to make email ballots accommodate important timeliness matters such as points of order.

Through litigation Aaron and I are fighting for the taxpayers by forcing compliance with financial transparency laws, demanding refunds of approximately \$30 million illegally siphoned by the city out of the utilities and into the general fund, etc. By the time the LNC votes on these appointments, Aaron and I expect to have submitted enough signatures to qualify 5 more government reform measures for the local 2020 ballot.

People who knowingly redefine words and grossly misrepresent situations in order to apply emotionally inflammatory labels designed to demonize anyone who opposes them, so as to avoid discussion of the actual facts and merits of the pending issue. First, give him the benefit of the doubt and repeat the counterarugment in case it was genuinely missed. Second, try to rephrase or reformulate the rebuttal to resonate with different points of view or bring in more supporting evidence to make its case stronger. Third, (if neither of the first two methods are effective) assume he is purposely misrepresenting incapable of being reached, and politely correct him solely for the benefit of other participants.

I have been very influenced by Ludwig von Mises' Human Action, Friedrich Hayek's Road to Serfdom, and Frederic Bastiat's The Law. Although many advocates of State interventionism in society may be well-intentioned, their intentions often pave the way to a Hell on Earth because of a fundamental failure to comprehend human nature and incentives. Libertarians properly recognize that humans have inherent personal dreams and goals, and the best and most vibrant society is one that unleashes individual potential by restraining the power of the State over individual life, liberty, and property. Ideally, the individual should be allowed to pursue all endeavors that does not restrict the life, liberty, or property of another. The State's responsibility is to ensure this liberty of action free from coercion--not to restrain freedom among consenting individuals. Also, just as individuals have a moral duty to be financially responsible, so does the State. Under the tutelage of both major Parties, the Government has become tyrannical and fiscally irresponsible, essentially being used by the special interests of the Party in power to funnel money and programs to their pet projects. Libertarians forswear the use of Government power to benefit crony interests with hard-earned taxpaver funds.

(optional) What is your position on committee transparency (should all meetings and emails be open to observation by Party members or should there be limitations)?

I am a firm believer in transparency. However, committee members are also entitled to a modicum of privacy regarding their emails and pre-decisional deliberations. 

I believe the heart and soul of libertarianism is the Non-Aggression Principle, the idea that each person should be free to live as they choose so long as it does not involve the initiation of force or fraud against others. Individuals (not states) are sovereign, and have rights including the right to own property, the rights to freedom of speech and expression, the rights to self-defense and defense of others, the right to freedom of religion, the right to freedom of movement excluding trespassing on private property, the right to freedom of association,

(optional) What is your position on committee transparency (should all committee meetings and emails be open to Party members or should there be limitations?

I strongly support committee transparency, both in general, but for the Bylaws Committee in particular, as essential to the bottom-up governance of the Libertarian Party as a grassroots organization run by and accountable to its members. Party members not serving on a committee should be able to fully participate in all committee proceedings (both online and in-person conversations) short of making motions or voting. All committee documents and materials should be transparent to party members and accessible via the committee page on the LP.org website, along with committee members' contact information, their terms of appointment, advance notice of committee meetings, each committee member's voting history, and information on the committee.

(optional) What are some of your most important accomplishments?

Perhaps AI will be able to answer such questions in the future, but I have no idea! My most concrete or visible accomplishments (e.g. having graduated college with a degree in journalism, having been a sergeant in the U.S. government's army, beating a prostitution charge, media attention, etc.) are not necessarily the most important. The nature of my work, both as a companion and as an activist, is such that its impact can be difficult to determine. I'd like to think I have made a positive impact in people's personal lives, and for the cause of freedom, but I'll probably never have much real knowledge about the degree to which this is true.

I have been very influenced by Ludwig von Mises' Human Action, Friedrich Hayek's Road to Serfdom, and Frederic Bastiat's The Law. Although many advocates of State interventionism in society may be well-intentioned, their intentions often pave the way to a Hell on Earth because of a fundamental failure to comprehend human nature and incentives. Libertarians properly recognize that humans have inherent personal dreams and goals, and the best and most vibrant society is one that unleashes individual potential by restraining the power of the State over individual life, liberty, and property. Ideally, the individual should be allowed to pursue all endeavors that does not restrict the life, liberty, or property of another. The State's responsibility is to ensure this liberty of action free from coercion--not to restrain freedom among consenting individuals. Also, just as individuals have a moral duty to be financially responsible, so does the State. Under the tutelage of both major Parties, the Government has become tyrannical and fiscally irresponsible, essentially being used

by the special interests of the Party in power to funnel money and programs to their pet projects. Libertarians forswear the use of Government power to benefit crony interests with hard-earned taxpayer funds.

# (optional) What is your position on committee transparency (should all meetings and emails be open to observation by Party members or should there be limitations)?

I am a firm believer in transparency. However, committee members are also entitled to a modicum of privacy regarding their emails and pre-decisional deliberations. **Colonel Albert R. Veldhuyzen** was born in Osaka, Japan, and grew up in Illinois, Lebanon, and Morocco. As a result of his upbringing, he speaks fluent French and Spanish. After returning to Illinois and graduating from high school, he attended Northwestern University, double-majoring in Political Science (comparative politics concentration) and French/Hispanic Studies. After two years working for DC public policy organizations, COL Veldhuyzen attended and obtained a Juris Doctor from the George Mason University Law School. COL Veldhuyzen also graduated from the U.S. Army War College with a Master in Strategic Studies in 2013.

Upon graduating from law school and passing the Virginia Bar exam in 1990, he was commissioned as a First Lieutenant in the Judge Advocate General's Corps with his first duty assignment at the Ft. Meade Garrison. After two years practicing claims, legal assistance, and physical evaluation law, he was transferred to the U.S. Army Claims Service working on high-value tort and medical malpractice claims. The next duty assignment was with the 3ID and 1ID in Kitzingen, Germany, doing legal assistance and then trial defense. After two years in Germany, he was appointed as the Editor of *The Army Lawyer* and the *Military Law Review* at The Judge Advocate General's Legal Center and School in Charlottesville, Virginia. He then served as the Chief of Administrative Law for the Military District of Washington at Fort McNair.

In June 1999, then-Major Veldhuyzen left active duty to accept an attorney position with the Office of General Counsel at the Federal Election Commission (FEC). After 14 years at the FEC, he became a Department of the Army Civilian in December 2013, serving as the Chief of Administrative & Civil Law at the Fort Belvoir Garrison, a position he currently holds.

Since June 1999, COL Veldhuyzen has served as an active Reserve Soldier, serving with the 10<sup>th</sup> LOD, the 9<sup>th</sup> TSC, the 377<sup>th</sup> TSC, and the 151<sup>st</sup> LOD in various capacities, to include Chief of Administrative/Operational Law, and Deputy Commander. In 2006-07, he was deployed to Iraq and Kuwait with the 377<sup>th</sup> TSC, and served as the Deputy Staff Judge Advocate. Subsequently, he mobilized at the Intelligence and Security Command (INSCOM) from January 2011 until June 2013 serving as the Assistant SJA for Administrative Law. He was promoted to Colonel in February 2012. After demobilizing from INSCOM, he served as the SJA of the 87<sup>th</sup> U.S. Army Reserve Support Command (East) headquartered in Birmingham, Alabama, and then as the SJA of the Army Reserve Medical Command in Pinellas Park, Florida. In April 2017, he deployed again, this time with INSCOM's Contract Linguist and Intelligence Program Support Office (CLIPSO), supervising ACORs in Kuwait, Iraq, and Afghanistan, and ensuring the success of the DOD linguist program. He is currently serving as the SJA of DLA-ARE.

I do appreciate that there are at the last count 35 applicants for 10 seats, and that followup with each applicant by all 25 members of the LNC is logistically inefficient. By my understanding there will be an electronic meeting later this month to make the selections for the Bylaws committee, and it is likely that I will not get the opportunity to discuss my application with the members of the LNC. Thus, I am emailing the Committee to express some points that may not have translated well in the application process.

First, I would like to reiterate that although I may disagree with the methods and questions of the application, to which I voiced my disagreement, should the Committee select me I will keep the interests of the party above my own personal interests. I believe this to be a necessary to safeguard the rights and privileges of each member within the Libertarian Party. I hold no hidden motives to subvert or change what have been established over the decades as the principles of the party, because I do not view that as the job of the position to which I applied. Moreover, that is the reason I applied to this

specific committee as opposed seeking a position on the Platform or advisory committees. In short, this is the committee that I can have the greatest positive impact for the Party.

Second, although my submission of attached examples was a prospective amendment to the bylaws that would radically redefine the methods of operation of the National Party, I realize that there are historical aspects of which I am unaware. This draft amendment is not a pet project, but a sincere belief that structural changes are needed in the National Party to increase efficacy or the Party's efforts. I do also realize that I could be wrong in my belief, and would welcome the chance to debate the aspects of my proposal. I fully intend to work within the scope of authority that the Bylaws Committee holds, and will not intentionally disrupt the work of the committee should disagreements arise in the event I am appointed to the committee.

Lastly, I have additional examples of my work on bylaws at the state and county levels in Montana that I will happily provide to any LNC member that requests additional supporting documentation. I have given Mr. Longstreth examples of a county bylaw template that is now in use in Montana, which was redrafted to harmonize with the National and MTLP bylaws. I do realize that hashing out bylaws is some people's least favorite task, but I actually thrive at analyzing the logic behind rules. How we define and agree in our interactions is at the core of how we as Libertarian intend to govern once elected. That is the role that I hoe to contribute as a member of the Bylaws Committee. I appreciate your time, and humbly as that you seriously consider my application.

How long have you been a dues paying member of National?

Are you involved with your state or local party? How so?

Yes. I am the former Chair of the Montana Libertarian Party (MTLP), current chair of the MTLP Judicial Committee, current Political Director for the MTLP, and current Secretary for the Libertarian Party of Gallatin Valley. I was a candidate for the Montana state legislature in 2016 and 2018.

Have you ever served on a similar committee before? Do you have any reports or finished products you can refer the LNC to? What are your specific qualifications to serve on this particular committee?

Yes, It is within the jurisdiction of the MTLP Judicial committee to review and recommend amendments to the MTLP bylaws. Additionally, while serving on the MTLP Executive Board, we redrafted the MTLP bylaws to redefine the structure of the party in Montana. While serving as Chair I consolidated and produced a template set of county bylaws for use through out Montana to ease the formation of grassroots parties in Montana. That template has since been adopted by 3 county parties within the state.

I have also produced language for bylaws amendments at both the state and national level. My strength is in codifying organizational efficiencies and reducing unneeded language.

What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

This is a modified version of an LP Bylaws amendment that I proposed through Mrs. Harlos in 2018. It was not recommended by the 2018 Bylaws committee, and I have since modified it to include additional solutions to problems I have observed with the LNC.

RESTRUCTURING OF THE LNC

Rationale: The current system of representation on the LNC is heavily weighted to favor state affiliates with greater aggregate populations and transitively greater sustaining membership. This structure disincentivizes lower population states to interact with the LNC due to disproportionate representation as membership levels are used in the calculation twice. Once in delegate representation at convention to elect members-at-large, and again in determining the composition of the regions. As such, the regional map is highly erratic placing a greater burden on regional representatives who have larger geographical regions and more state affiliates with which to coordinate.

Currently, regions vary from two to eleven affiliates and two affiliates are without direct representation on the LNC. Although the concept of voluntary association between affiliates is admirable, it creates a non-intuitive system that results in a highly-variable, volatile system with a potentially restructuring every two years. Further, there is a very low probability that under this system there that the ten theoretical regions will ever exist simultaneously. These structural issues cost valuable time and focus at convention detracting from the greater purpose of conducting the business of getting Libertarians elected.

This proposed bylaw amendment is intended to codify geographically compact and continuous regions to remove the required energy and work needed to maintain the current voluntarily associative structure. Additionally, it provides structural stability in the organization of the LNC. This plan makes regions less variable, with each having between four to

six affiliates, thereby increasing the effective representation of many affiliates and simultaneously reducing the workload of regional representatives.

This plan leaves intact the officer and at-large portion of the LNC, but designates them as the Executive Committee (separate from the LNC) to oversee the aspects that the current Executive Committee is tasked with in the Policy Manual. The LNC would then be comprised of the Officers and 2 regional representatives from each of the ten codified regions and tasked with committee appointments, oversight, and other tasks performed by the LNC as it currently exists. This is primarily because as committees grow their efficacy diminishes, and an ineffective LNC is detrimental to the Party. Under this plan Affiliates with larger sustaining membership will have a greater say in deciding the nine Executive Committee members, and the LNC will have a greater and diverse set of representatives to truly represent the members of the Party. This plan will improve the efficacy of the national party.

This plan is intended to be politically neutral and not favor any specific affiliate or caucus but engage members across the Libertarian spectrum while keeping as close as possible to current regions and organization.

3. The Chair shall preside at all Conventions and all meetings of the National and Executive Committees. #### Have you read the Statement of Principles? Do you agree with it?

- 17. All meetings of the Executive Committee shall be closed sessions with records, agendas, and minutes subject to confidentiality restrictions as defined in the National Policy Manual.

18. The National Committee shall hold sole authority to amend the National Policy Manual, set the budgets of the Party, and appoint members to committees.

This amendment shall take effect at the call to order of the Libertarian National Convention to be held in the year 2022.

#### Are you involved with your state or local party? How so?

Yes, State Chair, Kentucky, since March 2019; previously state secretary, Kentucky from 2017-2019. Involved with various committees (including rules committees for Kentucky from 2015-2017). Before that, since 2014, the party and its candidates were clients of my law form and I have handled litigation and legal matters in Ohio and Kentucky on behalf of the LP, it's candidates, and ballot petitioning efforts.

Have you ever served on a similar committee before? Do you have any reports or finished products you can refer the LNC to? What are your specific qualifications to serve on this particular committee?

Yes, involved in doing the same thing at the state level, including a complete rewrite to conform to ballot access requirements under state law after Gary Johnson's +2% got the party ballot access. I can provide copies of work in 2017, 2018, and 2019 to refer the party to.

Oliver Hall and Nick Sarwark can probably speak to my legal writing and work product, since some of the LP cases I handled have involved work with them.

#### What changes, if any, are you interested in proposing (please submit a sample proposed change).

I am a state chair, and I understand that 90% of what a good rules committee should do is outreach to the membership including the affiliates for suggestions. I am not seeking to advance any particular change and have no particular agenda other than to be a voice for affiliates. I am also interested in pointing out pros and cons of any proposal because usually there is an upside and a downside to any proposal.

One thought that has come to mind is having the regions elect a representative to the judicial committee so we actually fill that committee. The language could read as follows:

"In addition to the regional representative, each region shall elect a single member to the judicial committee, through a vote taken by the delegates of that region, by the close of the national convention."

#### Have you read the Statement of Principles? Do you agree with it?

Yes, and yes. I was at the conventions in Orlando and New Orleans (and will be our delegation chair at Austin), and agree with the move to close the loophole to protect the SOP.

Will you commit to show up and actively participate in committee email discussions and any in-person meetings?

Yes.

Please give a brief (a few sentences) summary of your understanding of Libertarian philosophy.

We seek to minimize government and maximize freedom and are strongly opposed to the offensive use of force or the threat of force to achieve political or social objectives.

# (optional) What is your position on committee transparency (should all meetings and emails be open to observation by Party members or should there be limitations)?

In my opinion there should be complete transparency on any final or other votes and discussions related to final proposals or votes, as well as late in process discussions and formulation of majority or minority reports.

I feel a tug and pull on the following: (I) if the committee is receiving legal advice on proposals I am not sure it would be wise to waive the privilege and open that advice up to the party's adversaries (this may not be an issue at all at national but it was at the state level where we were confirming our governing documents to state law to put candidates on the ballot); (II) sometimes opening up committees to outside scrutiny in early meetings can squelch open discussion, which impairs a vetting of pros and cons and frank discussion.

The end votes and end positions of the committee members and who voted for what and why must be completely transparent to membership.

In regards to (II), my experience is that if you do open them (and I am not opposed to doing it), people will just have those discussions between themselves and not at the official committee meeting or on the official email list, and what you may end up with is less transparency between the members of the committee.

#### (optional) What kind of people annoy you the most, and how do you deal with them?

I am pretty even keeled and can deal with a variety of personalities and backgrounds. I have to do it as a state chair and in my practice. I try and make sure everyone is heard but I also know when it's time to end discussion and vote to get business done.

Article 14. Section 5

A candidate's nomination may be suspended by a 3/4 vote of the entire membership of the National Committee at a meeting. That candidate's nomination shall then be declared null and void unless the suspended candidate appeals the suspension to the Judicial Committee within

seven days of receipt of notification of suspension. The resolution of suspension must state the specific reasons for suspension and must be signed by each member of the National Committee agreeing thereto. The Judicial Committee shall set a date for hearing the appeal within 30 days

of receipt of the appeal and shall notify all interested persons, which persons shall have the right to appear and present evidence and argument. At the hearing the burden of persuasion shall rest upon the appellant. The Judicial Committee shall issue its ruling within 20 days of the hearing and in no case later than 30 days prior to the General Election. Failure of the Judicial Committee to rule within 20 days shall constitute an affirmation of the

National Committee's suspension of the candidate except when the last day of the 30 day period falls within 20 days prior to the General Election, in which case the Judicial Committee's non-action shall result in reinstatement of the candidate's status. At such times as the suspension is final, the office in question shall be deemed vacant.

Yes I have read it, and yes I agree with it.

# **OKLAHOMA COUNTY LIBERTARIAN PARTY BYLAWS**

#### **PREAMBLE**

The Oklahoma County Libertarian Party (OCLP) is dedicated to serving the interests of individuals who have publicly affiliated themselves with the libertarian philosophy and who embrace the following principles:

We, the members of the Libertarian Party, challenge the cult of the omnipotent state and defend the rights of the individual.

We hold that all individuals have the right to exercise sole dominion over their own lives, and have the right to live in whatever manner they choose, so long as they do not forcibly interfere with the equal right of others to live in whatever manner they choose.

Governments throughout history have regularly operated on the opposite principle, that the State has the right to dispose of the lives of individuals and the fruits of their labor. Even within the United States, all political parties other than our own grant to government the right to regulate the lives of individuals and seize the fruits of their labor without their consent.

We, on the contrary, deny the right of any government to do these things, and hold that where governments exist, they must not violate the rights of any individual: namely,

- (1) the right to life—accordingly we support the prohibition of the initiation of physical force against others;
- (2) the right to liberty of speech and action—accordingly we oppose all attempts by government to abridge the freedom of speech and press, as well as government censorship in any form; and
- (3) the right to property—accordingly we oppose all government interference with private property, such as confiscation, nationalization, and eminent domain, and support the prohibition of robbery, trespass, fraud, and misrepresentation.

Since governments, when instituted, must not violate individual rights, we oppose all interference by government in the areas of voluntary and contractual relations among individuals. People should not be forced to sacrifice their lives and property for the benefit of others. They should be left free by government to deal with one another as free traders; and the resultant economic system, the only one compatible with the protection of individual rights, is the free market.

#### 1. NAME AND PURPOSE

- **1.1.** Name: The name of the organization is the Oklahoma County Libertarian Party (hereinafter referred to as "OCLP" or "the Party").
- **1.2. Structure:** The OCLP is to be a political organization constituted by its members, governed by the Annual Business Meeting at its County Convention, responsive to its affiliated District Organizations, and directed by its Governing Body according to these bylaws; with the express goal of working to place Libertarians into public office.
- **1.3. Functions:** The OCLP is to arrange and hold precinct and county conventions in Oklahoma County, Oklahoma and, when appropriate, district conventions and report the results thereof; to support nominees of the Oklahoma Libertarian Party (hereinafter referred to as the "OKLP") and help elect those nominees to public office; to educate the Oklahoma voting public about the OKLP and its principles; and generally grow the party in Oklahoma County and nearby counties and throughout Oklahoma.

- **1.4. Bona Fide Party:** The OCLP is a bona fide political party county affiliate under the laws of the state of Oklahoma, and as such is authorized to receive political contributions. The OCLP accepts political contributions in the name of the OCLP or the Oklahoma County Libertarian Party.
- **1.5. Purpose:** The OCLP is committed to the principles stated in the Declaration of Independence and supports those principles as incorporated into the Constitution of the United States of America.
  - **1.5.1.** The OCLP holds that all individuals have the right to exercise sole dominion over their own lives, and have the right to live in whatever manner they choose, limited only by the obligation to recognize the equal right of others to live in whatever manner they choose.
  - **1.5.2.** Section 1.5.1 above shall constitute a statement of commitment to be verbally agreed upon and signed in affirmation by all members, officers of, and candidates endorsed by the OCLP as per Section 12 of these Bylaws.
- **1.6.** Address: The mailing address of the OKLP shall be as designated by the Governing Body.

#### 2. MEMBERSHIP

2.1. Membership: Membership shall consist of Enrolled Members and Governing Body Members.

#### 2.1.1. OCLP Enrollee Membership

- **2.1.1.1.** A person is eligible to become an Enrolled Member (or "Voting Member") of OCLP if he or she:
  - 2.1.1.1.1. is a resident of Oklahoma County,
  - 2.1.1.1.2. supports the OCLP's Statement of Principles,
  - **2.1.1.1.3.** Paid dues to the OCLP in accordance with the requirements established in Section 2.2 of the bylaws.
- **2.1.1.2.** A person's Voting Membership terminates if he or she:
  - **2.1.1.2.1.** ceases to be eligible as defined by 2.1.1.1 above

#### 2.1.2. OCLP Governing Body:

- **2.1.2.1.** Members of the Governing Body of the OCLP shall reside in Oklahoma County and meet all of the following requirements:
  - **2.1.2.1.1.** Meets all the requirements of an Enrolled Member as defined by 2.1.1
  - 2.1.2.1.2. is a qualified Oklahoma voter
  - **2.1.2.1.3.** registered as a Libertarian to vote in Oklahoma County,
  - **2.1.2.1.4.** Member of the Oklahoma Libertarian Party
  - **2.1.2.1.5.** is not affiliated with any other political party, and
  - **2.1.2.1.6.** Paid dues to the OCLP in accordance with the requirements established in Section 2.2 of the bylaws.

#### 2.2. Dues

- **2.2.1.** Annual dues required from all members shall be \$25.
- **2.2.2.** Membership with the OKLP shall be recognized as membership in the OCLP, provided members meet the requirements of 2.1.1.
- **2.2.3.** Dues are payable to the Treasurer of the OCLP on or before March 1st of each membership year.
- **2.2.4.** Members who join after March 1st shall have their dues prorated and evenly divided by the number of remaining months of the fiscal year.
- 2.2.5. The Treasurer shall maintain a Membership Roll based on payment of dues. Any member who has not paid current year dues by April 15th shall be removed from the Membership Roll. Individuals removed from the Membership Roll may be restored at anytime by payment of dues to the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall report changes to the Membership Roll at each Governing Body meeting.

#### 2.3. Rights of Membership

#### 2.3.1. Enrolled Members of the OCLP:

- **2.3.1.1.** Shall have voting privileges at any convention.
- **2.3.1.2.** Shall be entitled to join the Governing Body by written notice to the Treasurer and by paying the associated additional dues, provided he/she qualifies as per Section 2.1.2.
- 2.3.1.3. Enrolled Members shall have the right to participate in official affairs and governance of the OCLP in accordance with these Bylaws. Such right shall be inviolate and the willful abridgment of such right by an officer or member of any committee shall be sufficient cause for removal of such officer or committee member.
  - **2.3.1.3.1.** Enrolled Members shall have the right to be members of Standing Committees and may be appointed and serve as Director of said committee at the discretion of the Chair.

#### 2.3.2. Governing Body members:

- **2.3.2.1.** Have voting rights at all meetings of the Governing Body and at the annual convention.
- **2.3.2.2.** Are eligible to serve as officers of the OCLP.

#### 3. OFFICERS

- **3.1.** The officers of the OCLP shall be the Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, and three (3) District Coordinators or At-Large Members to represent the three County Road Districts (CRD).
  - **3.1.1.** The Chairman, Secretary, or Treasurer may serve simultaneously as the Representative to the Regional Affiliate.
- **3.2.** All officers of the OCLP must be members of the Governing Body as specified in Section 2.1.2 of these bylaws.
- 3.3. The six elected positions of the OCLP shall be elected at the annual County Convention by a majority vote of the duly credentialed qualified delegates to the County Convention; provided, however, that the Governing Body has the right and authority to fill any vacant position, pursuant to these bylaws.

- **3.3.1.** No proxy voting is permitted.
- **3.4.** Officers shall take office upon close of the Convention and shall serve thereafter for a period of two (2) years, concluding upon the adjournment of the second Regular County Convention to which they were elected.
  - **3.4.1.** Officers elected due to vacancy per Section 3.5 shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.
  - **3.4.2.** Elections for Chairperson, Secretary, and the District Coordinator representing District 2 shall be held in even numbered years. Elections for the Treasurer and the District Coordinators representing Districts 1 and 3, respectively, shall be held in odd numbered years.
  - **3.4.3.** Election of officers shall be conducted by Australian secret ballot or by an approved, immutable, electronic voting device
  - **3.4.4.** A voice vote may be used if only one candidate has been nominated.
  - 3.4.5. Every ballot must have an entry for 'none of the above' (NOTA). After each ballot, the candidate with the least number of votes is dropped and the voting is continued until one candidate wins a majority of votes. If NOTA wins a majority of votes, none of the previously nominated candidates may be re-nominated and if no candidate meeting the requirements of office is nominated, the position will remain empty until otherwise filled as specified here or elsewhere in these By-Laws.
- **3.5.** Nominations and elections may be held at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Governing Body to replace an officer unwilling or unable to complete his or her term of office. The voting procedure used to elect officers at the Annual Convention as defined by Section 3.4.5 shall be followed.
- **3.6.** No person shall hold an Elected Governing Body position while serving in elected public office.
- **3.7.** No elected officer of the OCLP shall be a Chairperson of a committee; This does not preclude any elected officer from serving as a member of any Standing Committee.
- **3.8.** No offices shall be combined.

#### 4. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

#### 4.1. Duties of the Chair:

- **4.1.1.** The Chairperson is the chief executive officer of the Party and shall coordinate the activities of the Governing Body and Party members in achieving the objectives and goals of the Party.
- **4.1.2.** The Chairperson shall be responsible for the enforcement of these Bylaws and the carrying out of the directions and resolutions of the Governing Body and the County Convention in accordance with these Bylaws.
- **4.1.3.** The Chairperson shall assist in all State and County Libertarian Party campaigns and all activities, functions, and campaigns within the County, unless these conflict fundamentally with the principles of the Party, and
- **4.1.4.** The Chairperson shall serve as a member of all standing committees.
- **4.1.5.** The Chairperson shall preside at all meetings of the Governing Body and may, at his/her discretion, preside at Party Conventions.
- **4.1.6.** The Chairperson shall be the primary spokesperson, but may delegate this function to any other Party member in good standing.

- **4.1.7.** The Chairperson shall insure that all state and federal laws pertaining to political parties are complied with and make provision for legal services for the Party.
- **4.1.8.** The Chairperson shall oversee the development of new district or precinct organizations.

#### 4.2. Duties of the Treasurer:

- **4.2.1.** The Treasurer shall be custodian of all funds of the Governing Body and the Party and shall disburse the same in accordance with decisions to spend such funds by the Governing Body or otherwise set forth by these Bylaws.
- **4.2.2.** The Treasurer is responsible for oversight of all financial functions, including, but not limited to receipts, disbursements, internal and external reporting.
- **4.2.3.** The Treasurer shall,
- **4.2.4.** from time to time, report to the Governing Body and the County Convention both the financial situation of the Party and the results of its activities.
- **4.2.5.** make any and all financial reports required by the Oklahoma Ethics Commission through the Guardian Reporting System and/or other reports required by state law.
- **4.2.6.** perform other duties pertaining to the office of Treasurer or as directed by the Chairperson.

#### 4.3. Duties of the Secretary:

- **4.3.1.** The duties of the Secretary are to keep and maintain accurate minutes and records of all meetings and conventions.
- **4.3.2.** Must maintain other records including mailing lists and a roster of OCLP Voting Members.
- **4.3.3.** Perform other duties usually pertaining to the office of secretary.
- **4.3.4.** The Secretary shall be the chief assistant to the Chair, and
- **4.3.5.** Performing such duties as the Chair shall prescribe, and holding such executive powers as the Chair shall delegate.
- **4.3.6.** Shall perform the duties of the Chair in the event that the Chair is, for any reason, unable to perform the duties of the office.
- **4.3.7.** The Secretary will serve as liaison and coordinator for all standing committees; and
- **4.3.8.** Prior to any election, the Secretary shall notify the membership of any members who may be subject to censure and the grounds therefore.

#### 4.4. Duties of the District Coordinator

- **4.4.1.** Each District Coordinator shall represent their respective County Road District (CRD).
- **4.4.2.** District Coordinators need not be residents of their respective CRD, but is encouraged.
- **4.4.3.** Each Coordinator is responsible for organizing Outreach, Recruitment, and GOTV activities within their respective districts at the precinct level.
- **4.4.4.** At each regular meeting the Coordinators will present a report of those activities to assist in the planning and implementation of County goals.
- 4.5. The duties of the Representative to the CenOKLP shall be to attend meetings of the Regional Committee, and to represent the OCLP and vote at said meetings with the best interests of the OCLP as prime consideration. The Regional Representative can be removed for cause by a majority vote at a

regular meeting of the OCLP if the Representative fails to attend two consecutive meetings of the Regional Committee or fails to provide a written or oral report of the Regional Committee activities at two consecutive regular meetings of the OCLP Governing Body.

**4.6.** If any officer is absent for two successive meetings, at the call of the second meeting, the position shall be declared vacant. A vacancy in any office may be filled by the Governing Body pursuant to these Bylaws.

#### 5. MEETINGS AND CONVENTIONS

**5.1.** All regularly scheduled meetings, annual conventions, and special conventions of the OCLP are to be open to the public.

#### 5.2. Annual County Conventions

- 5.2.1. The Party shall meet every year in a County Convention held during the months of February, March, or April. The County Convention shall be scheduled to comply with Oklahoma Libertarian Party deadlines for the election of delegates for the State Convention, or any other Oklahoma Libertarian Party or Central Oklahoma Libertarian Party requirements. Officers and members of the Governing Body shall be elected at this time in accordance with the requirements set forth in Section 3.4.2 of these Bylaws. Amendments to the Platform and Bylaws of the Party may be considered at any convention. The Governing Body at any time in the interests of the Party, may direct the Secretary, or if that person be not available or if said office is vacant, the Treasurer, to issue a Call for special meetings or Conventions and shall fix the times and places thereof. The procedure for calling regular County Conventions shall apply to the calling of special meetings and conventions so far as applicable and not inconsistent with these Bylaws.
  - **5.2.1.1.** All members will be given timely notice of the date and location of the OCLP Annual Convention in a manner and time as determined by the Chair
  - **5.2.1.2.** The Chair or the Chair's designee shall call the annual convention to order. The Secretary or the Treasurer will immediately be asked for a report on the attendance at the time the convention was called to order.
    - **5.2.1.2.1.** A quorum for the annual convention shall consist of a number of members equal to 50% of the number of current Voting Members who are listed on the Treasurer's Membership Roll and in attendance at the time of the call to order. As individuals are free to come and go during a convention, a quorum may be represented by different individuals throughout the convention.
  - **5.2.1.3.** No decisions at the Annual Convention requiring a vote shall be made without a quorum present.

#### 5.3. Governing Body meetings:

- **5.3.1.** The OCLP shall hold regularly scheduled meetings of the Governing Body and shall be open to the public. Public notice shall be given on the official Oklahoma County Libertarian Party website 14 days prior to the meeting: in addition, other notices may be used.
- **5.3.2.** A quorum for all regular and special meetings of the OCLP Governing Body shall consist of the Chair, Secretary or Treasurer, and 50% of the elected Governing Body.
- **5.3.3.** No decisions requiring a vote shall be made without a quorum present as defined in section 5.3.2.
- **5.3.4.** Proxy voting is not permitted.

- **5.3.5.** If no Governing Body member objects, the Chair may call a special meeting of the Governing Body via electronic media in which votes may be taken and business transacted just as in an in-person, public meeting.
- **5.3.6.** Any persons engaging in inappropriate conduct at a meeting may be asked to discontinue such conduct or leave.

#### 5.4. Special Conventions and Non-Routine Meetings

- **5.4.1.** The Chair or any other two members of the Governing Body may call a special meeting, also called a "Special Convention," to conduct non-routine business such as removal of a member for cause, for the purposes of electing a member to fill a vacancy, or for the Governing Body to receive direction from the Enrolled Membership.
- 5.4.2. At a Special Convention, any OCLP Voting Member as of seven days prior to the Special Convention is eligible to vote, and a quorum to conduct business shall be ten Voting Members in good standing. The Special Convention shall have full authority of the OCLP to act except where there is a conflict with Oklahoma state or federal election laws
- **5.4.3.** Special Conventions may be called to propose amendments to the Bylaws as outlined in Section 8.2.1.
- **5.4.4.** No decisions at the Special Convention requiring a vote shall be made without a quorum present.
- 5.5. The Rules contained in the current edition of ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, NEWLY REVISED, shall govern parliamentary procedure in all conventions, caucuses, meetings, and convention committees in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not in conflict with these Bylaws and any special rules or order the Party may adopt.

#### 6. ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

- **6.1.** The OCLP shall consist of 7 Standing Committees in order to facilitate day-to-day operations of the Party and to provide guidance in achieving the goals as set forth in the Mission Statement.
- **6.2.** The Chairperson of the Governing Body shall appoint officers to the Standing Committees in accordance with Section 3.7 of these Bylaws.

#### 7. EXPENDITURES

- **7.1.** No expenditures of funds of the OCLP shall be made without the approval of the Chairperson or Treasurer.
- **7.2.** Officers must faithfully preserve a reserve account for Ethics compliance and party maintenance.
- **7.3.** No expenditures of funds in excess of \$200 of the OCLP shall be made without the approval of a majority of the Governing Body.
- **7.4.** The Treasurer shall make a report of income, expenditures and ending balance of all accounts at each Governing Body meeting.
- **7.5.** Upon written request of any Governing Body member, the Treasurer shall, within two (2) business days, produce an itemized statement of all income, expenditures and ending balance of all accounts.

#### 8. BYLAWS

**8.1.** These Bylaws shall take effect immediately if accepted by majority vote of the organizing members of the OCLP present at the founding convention to be held April 21, 2018, and all founding members shall have thirty (30) days to pay dues.

- 8.2. These Bylaws may be amended at any County Convention or Special Convention by a ¼ vote of all eligible Enrolled and Governing Body Members. The Voting Members may modify or add to the proposed amendments by a simple majority vote. A two-thirds vote is required to adopt any amendments and permanently change these rules and bylaws. Except as otherwise noted in Section 8.3.
  - **8.2.1.** To be placed on the agenda of an annual County Convention or any Special Convention all proposed amendments must be communicated to the General Membership via electronic means and/or by mail and/or by any other means approved by the Chairman within 14 days of the annual convention of the OCLP.
- 8.3. The Statement of Principles as found in the Preamble shall only be revised or repealed upon % consent of all Enrolled and Governing Body Members assembled in Convention unless otherwise superseded by LNC Bylaws or OKLP State Bylaws, in which case, these bylaws may be amended to reflect the higher standard.
- **8.4.** The procedure for proposing amendments shall be as follows:
  - **8.4.1.** The Governing Body, upon a supermajority vote (60%) in favor of proposing an amendment, may call a Special Convention for the purpose of amending the Bylaws.
    - **8.4.1.1.** The Special Convention for the purposes of amending the Bylaws shall follow the procedures as outlined in Section 5.4.
  - **8.4.2.** Proposed amendments offered by the Governing Body not taken into consideration in a Special Convention shall be held for consideration by the Bylaws Committee at the next scheduled regular County Convention.
    - **8.4.2.1.** Upon the vote of a majority of the Bylaws Committee, the proposed amendment shall go to a vote of the delegation of Voting Members.
    - **8.4.2.2.** Approval shall be made in accordance with Section 8.2.
- **8.5.** Engrossment of approved amendments in these Bylaws shall take effect upon adjournment of the Convention.

#### 9. MEMBERS IN GOOD STANDING

- **9.1.** An individual is an Enrolled Member in good standing if the individual meets the requirements of section 2.1 and 2.2.2 as of the date of inquiry.
- **9.2.** An individual is a member of the Governing Body in Good Standing if the individual meets the requirements of section 2.1 and 2.2.2 as of the date of inquiry.

#### 10. POTENTIAL CONFLICT WITH OKLAHOMA ELECTION LAWS

10.1. In the event that these rules and bylaws conflict in any material respect with a provision of the election laws of the State of Oklahoma, OKLP Bylaws, or the Party Platform, the inconsistent rule or bylaw shall yield to the extent necessary to resolve the conflict.

#### 11. COUNTY AFFILIATION CHARTER

11.1. Whereas the Oklahoma County Libertarian Party, which purports to represent the Party, must obtain a Charter from the State Committee, which shall be issued only by majority vote of the entire Committee. Such Charter shall be valid thereafter until amended by majority vote of the State Committee, revoked by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the entire Committee, or three-fourths (3/4) vote of a State Convention; except that both the initial granting and/or subsequent revocation of a Charter shall be subject to approval by a majority vote of the State Convention.

- **11.1.1.** Upon ratification of these Bylaws by the organizing members of the OCLP present at the founding convention, the Governing Body shall have thirty (30) days to submit a Chartering Resolution to the State Executive Committee for approval.
- **11.1.2.** Upon approval of the Charter, the Governing Body of the OCLP shall allow the State Party Chairperson and the State Treasurer, access to OCLP records upon reasonable notice.

#### 12. AFFIRMATION OF PRINCIPLE

12.1. Enrolled members of the Party must sign in affirmation of the following statement: "I hereby certify that I do not believe in or advocate the initiation of force as a means of achieving political or social goals. I further maintain that all individuals have the right to exercise sole dominion over their own lives, and have the right to live in whatever manner they choose, limited only by the obligation to recognize the equal right of others to live in whatever manner they choose."
